COVERED WITH PROPAGANDA

Appeals to striking union men and other workers to join in a revolution have been circulated through the industrial districts of Chicago, and local government agents are watching the situation.

It was declared that William F. Cruise, one of the Socialists convicted with Victor L. Berger, all of whom were sentenced to Leavenworth penitentiary for 20 years, had on one occasion addressed striking employees of the Excelsior Motor & Supply company. Among those strikers some of the printed matter calling for a revolution was distributed.

The handbills found were addressed to the working people of America. They declared workers of Europe were arming themselves and asked: "Are you afraid to take by force what belongs to you? Will not you take by revolution the better way to the happier life?"

GIRLS DENIED CIGARETTES

BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 25.—While American girls seeking light and knowledge at Vassar College may heretofore smoke cigarettes beyond the college walls, smoking at the scores of women's colleges in Greater Boston still means social ostracism. Students at Radcliffe, Simmons and other institutions here have "tabooed" the cigarette. To be discovered at ease, cigarette between the lips, is a sure disgrace for woman students here.

PAYS \$20,000 FOR VASE

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Feb. 25.—The sum of \$20,000 was paid by the Museum of the University of Pennsylvania for a thousand-year-old Chinese vase. The treasure will become part of the University Museum permanent exhibit. The coveted vase is of light brown about fifteen inches high and is as well known in the history of Chinese art as Raphael's "Shipwrecked" or Michael Angelo's statue of Moses in the Occidental art.

BLUE DEVILS ON TOP IN LEAGUE

ORSON BRANDT EXCELS IN ROPE SCALING CONTEST AT THE Y. M. C. A.

Last night at the Y. M. C. A. the Blue Devils trounced the Tommies, 10 to 9, in the basketball league of the high school boys' gymnasium class, and the Devil Dogs won out by a six-point point over the Yanks, 13 to 12. The Devil Dogs would have had the lead by several points had not the Blue Devils come in with a new member last night, which gave them a lead of six points.

The Devil Dogs and the Blue Devils were the only teams that made points last night. The Devil Dogs won five points in basketball, and five points in the rope climb. The Blue Devils were awarded 10 points for a new member, one point for attendance, and five for basketball. The standing of the teams is as follows: Blue Devils 27-1-2, Devil Dogs 21-1-2, Tommies 8, and Yanks 4.
