FREE LECTURE

Will Be of Special Interest to Retail Merchants and Clerks.

Extreme interest is being manifested in the retail merchandising lecture which will be given free of charge to all merchants and clerks on Tuesday night, March 4, at 8 o'clock, in the high school auditorium. The lecture, which has been prepared by the National Cash Register company, contains the result of thirty-three years spent in collecting retail merchandising ideas from merchants in all parts of the world, and is by far the best lecture of its character on the retail day.

G. W. Sulley will be the lecturer, and by means of stereopticon slides and motion pictures he will tell the causes of failure, and explain some of the latest methods of storekeeping. An interesting feature of the lecture will be the part devoted to newspaper advertising. Writing of newspaper advertisements, selection of mediums, and the necessity for a policy of continuous advertising by the retailer will be taken up in detail. By the same method of the question of proper window display, delivery problems, perfection of a store organization, and other interesting matters will be discussed.

CHOOSES CHANCE OF FLU.

DAWSON, Y. T., Feb. 25.—Given his choice of six months' imprisonment or a journey south to face the influenza epidemic was the sentence of Colonel Knight, commander of the northwest mounted police here, for a notorious gambler after several raids had been made on alleged gambling dens. The gambler took the trip south with the thermometer registering 50 degrees below zero. So far no influenza has been reported in the upper Yukon region, owing to the strict quarantine of the mounted police.

Sergeant Hardos has won marine corps walking contests in Panama, Cuba, Haiti and the Philippine islands. The "walks" were 100 miles or longer, and were taken with full equipment, which weighed nearly 100 pounds.
