PASTOR SPEAKS IN BEHALF OF DRIVE

HOMES RESPONSE TO APPEAL OF CHURCH FOR FUNDS WILL BE GENEROUS.

Rev. N. Sherman Hawk, pastor of the First M. E. church in this city, speaks today of his church's financial drive which will soon be under way here, following up his statement yesterday, as follows:

"There is a great deal of unused power in our churches. It is lying dormant and needs to be stirred up, stimulated to action. A seed is of little value until the power lying dormant in it is excited to growth. The church has been and is a power, but it has also unused power, which needs to be awakened into activity.

"Take the prayer of faith for example—it has always been an arm of power. A praying church is a power. God has always urged his people to pray. Prayer releases unused power. It releases money. Only a few people are heroic givers. Many give nothing to the Lord's work. But we are learning to give under the spur of the drives for money to win the war. Our power to give must be still further awakened. We have given lavishly for others. We must now turn our thoughts to the home.

"This home, to which we call your attention, is the First Methodist Episcopal church of La Grande. Do not become bewildered by the multiplicity of drives. Keep your mind clear, that it is the church you want to help this time. There are many benevolent and fraternal organizations doing splendid work for old and young, but these are the echo of the voice, 'the church.' Do not quiet the voice, nor hinder its certain sound, or there will be no echo or else the echo, too, will be uncertain.

"Get ready for a great time on March 7th to 10th."
