FROM ABROAD IN THE STATE.

Motor vehicles registrations for January, 1919, exceeded those of January, 1918, by nearly 12,000, according to tabulations for the month as made public at the office of the Secretary of State, Oreg., there were 49,062 motor vehicle registrations for the past month, as against 37,219 for the same month of last year.

The prune packing plant of the California packing corporation in Dallas has been working on the 1918 crop continuously since the prune harvest began and has handled practically two-thirds of the crop, or more than 5,000,000 pounds of dried prunes. The plant still has about 2,000,000 pounds of fruit on hand and is making shipments to Eastern cities and European points almost every day.

By unanimous vote of the 28 senators who were present, the Senate Tuesday afternoon passed H. R. 494, by Richardson, which appropriates \$25,000 for use by the state land board and by the attorney general of the state for investigation of the land frauds which in past years stripped the state of thousands of acres of its state school lands.

MAY ADOPT PARKING PLAN

of the street when leaving them idle in the business section of the city was very favorably commented upon. John Collier, city manager, said that with the cars parked along the curb it is practically impossible for the street cleaners to do their work properly in the busy portions of the city, and consequently the gutters and the parts of the pavement next to the sidewalks are nearly always very dry. In this statement he was supported by C. J. Black, the street and water superintendent. With the cars left in the center of the street, headed directly toward the walks on the other side, it would be possible to remove all accumulations of dirt from the streets at any time of the day they said.

Mr. Black stated that he had recently visited three towns in Idaho, among them Twin Falls, where this plan has been followed with fine success. The city of Baker has also had it in force since a couple of months ago, it was said.

Dr. Brownson was afraid there might be more danger to pedestrians under this arrangement than with the present plan, but Mr. Black and others who have seen the plan worked out assured him that the reverse is the case. The commission promised to look into the question and to ask other cities for recommendations as to the desirability of the change, based on their experience.

The city manager, in introducing the question of the proposed memorial for Union county's dead soldiers, said that the Army and Navy Auxiliary had learned that the monument they have been considering would cost them twice as much as they had at first figured, and that also it was held that their funds could not be spent for this purpose.

He suggested, therefore, a plan which he said is being seriously considered in many other cities where the citizens wish to commemorate the sacrifice of their heroes, by which a public building of some sort would be erected as the memorial. If this plan would be favored locally, he said, he thought the best plan would be to construct the memorial in connection with the Y. M. C. A.

A building might be erected by public subscription for the public use, and particularly for the accommodation of returned soldiers, he said, and the city might find its opportunity to help such an undertaking along. They might, he said, assume the responsibility for the care of the building. Commissioner McKeanon favored the memorial idea strongly, but he expressed himself as opposed to the city getting involved in for any big expense in connection with the carrying out of the idea. It was suggested that the city should take the initiative in the matter, and have plans for a memorial promulgated, but the matter was left over for future discussion.

A lengthy discussion of the water question followed then. The city has been considering for some little time getting in some high authority on municipal engineering and turning him loose on the local water problem. The city manager reported that he had been in communication with several men, among them "the Thompson who made Seattle." Mr. Thompson, according to R. H. Neal, city engineer, is a head and shoulders above any other man in the game in the northwest. The board discussed for a while what they would likely have to pay Mr. Thompson to have him run down here from Seattle and advise them on their course, after he viewed the situation, and they finally decided that they would submit to him what data they have on the matter and try and get his opinion without incurring the expense of having him make a trip here.

Among other items of business

was the receiving of the report of the auditor, who has been working on the city's books for the past three weeks. The books were in good shape, the report stated. The city manager also forwarded a suggestion that the police station be remodelled. There is no present accommodations provided there for women who happen to be arrested, he said, and while this is a rare occurrence, the chief would like to be prepared for such cases.

This brought the business of the evening to a conclusion and the board passed a motion of adjournment.

Carrying 7000 tons of Portland flour for the relief of the starving people of Armenia, the steamship Western Belle, built on the Columbia, has passed Gibraltar and now is nearing Constantinople.
