JAPAN ONLY ASKS ARMS

Equipment Furnished Recalling Cosacks Is Issue With Americans.

VLADIVOSTOK, Feb. 27.—(Special)—Gen. Iwano, of the Japanese staff in Siberia, in a statement regarding the Japanese demand for the return of the arms and equipment of the 1500 Cosack soldiers of the force of General Kalkoff, who have been under the charge of the American forces, says he is not concerned about what becomes of the Cosacks, although he believes that the soldiers guilty of killing their officers at the time of the mutiny in January should be tried. The general's statement adds:

"The men do not belong to Japan. Their disposition is entirely a matter between General Graves, the American commander and the Russians. The arms and equipment of the soldiers, however, were furnished by the Japanese, who have been assisting, and will continue to assist, the Cosacks in an effort to build up the Russian army. Therefore, it is that the arms and equipment be returned to General Kalkoff."
