COUNTY ORGANIZATION WILL GIVE ROAD PROBLEM STUDY.

DATE OF MASS MEETING IS YET UNDETERMINED

Plan is to Get Every Part of County Represented and Then Decide What Kind of a Campaign is Needed to Inform the People Relative to Necessity of County Action.

At a meeting Friday evening of the road supporters it was decided to hold a mass meeting in La Grande at a date which would be agreeable to the members of the State Highway commission. At that meeting all committeemen are asked to come and bring with them men whom they know to be interested in the road problem of Union county. This does not mean that only advocates of paved highways shall be expected, but whether a man is for or against the proposed plan of road construction, just so he is an advocate and a believer in good roads he is expected to be present.

The Wallowa county delegation will attend the meeting as soon as it is called and will probably be a hundred strong, for Wallowa county has the good roads germ firmly implanted and it is working vigorously.

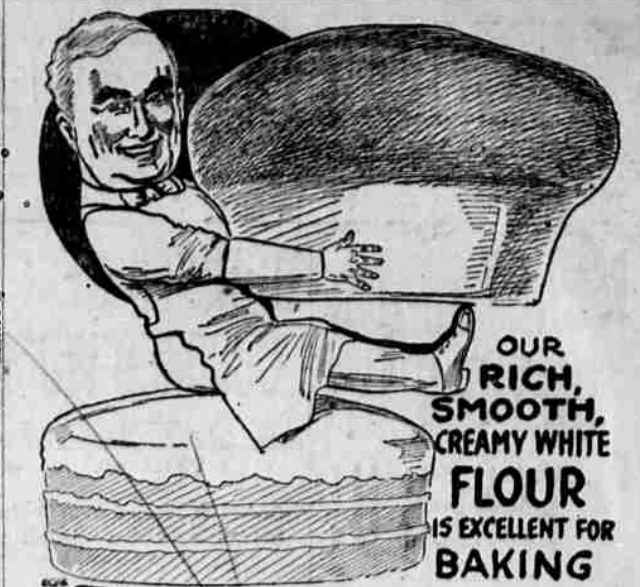
