HOOVER STORE TO MOVE SOON

THRIVING GROCERY WILL OCCUPY GOLDEN RULE SITE

Increasing Business Makes Removal To More Commodious Quarters Necessary, Says Sam Harris.

Sam Harris, proprietor of the Hooverized grocery, announced today that he has leased the Huntington building, recently vacated by the Golden Rule Company, and that he will remove his business into its new home in the near future. Mr. Harris was not able to say definitely when the change would be made, but it will be as soon as the improvements on the interior of the building are completed.

"We are moving because our business is growing so much that we are handicapped in our present quarters," says Mr. Harris; "and we are taking the Golden Rule building because it will permit us to carry on our business more efficiently and with greater satisfaction, both to our customers and to ourselves."

Several new features will be added to the business when it is located in its new quarters. Mr. Harris states. Everything that can possibly be done to enable them to better serve their patrons will be carried out. The whole building is being fitted up and remodelled inside and there will be installed many modern devices that will make possible a reduction in the cost of doing business. The purchasing public will get the full benefit of all such reductions.

One notable improvement will be the installation of a battery system of large capacity bins, together with an automatically controlled scale, which will quickly and accurately weigh out all bulk goods. The store will also be reorganized on the market place plan, with the idea that there will be in charge of each department of the business a sales person who will be eminently qualified through experience and knowledge to give his customers the very best in the way of service.

When business commences in the new stand there will be a fully developed mail order department in

connection that will take care of the needs of out of town customers in a more satisfactory manner than has been possible heretofore. On account of lack of proper quarters, Mr. Harris is confident that his store has demonstrated its ability to outdo any other mail order house doing business in eastern Oregon. His success in this respect, he says, is primarily due to the fact that he can give quicker service than Portland houses can, and that freight rates are not so high as from Portland.

It is the proprietor's intention to make his store more than ever indispensable to the purchasing public, and he promises that his customers here will get some agreeable surprises when he is able to receive them in his new location. The Hooverized will be one of the finest and largest businesses of its kind in the northwest when all the plans are carried out, it is said. Painters and carpenters are now at work on the interior of the premises, making the necessary alterations and improvements.

The new home of the Hooverized will in future be known as the People's Warehouse. M. A. Stilwell will occupy a space in the building for his meat department and Sam Andrews will have a hardware and variety department located therein.

IN CONVENTION HERE YESTERDAY

SUPERINTENDENTS AND PRINCIPALS' ANNUAL GATHERING

J. A. Churchill, State Superintendent of Schools, was Principal Speaker of Occasion.

The annual convention of the Superintendents' and Principals' association of Eastern Oregon was held in La Grande yesterday, the meetings being held in the auditorium of the high school. There was a good attendance, representing Baker, Union, Walla Walla and Umatilla counties, and interest ran high all through the sessions.

The convention opened in the morning with a round table discussion, led by A. C. Hampton, superintendent of the city schools. The discussion centered about a proposition to reorganize the state association into six divisions, with some one of which every teacher in the state would be expected to become identified. Miss Elmetta Bailey, superintendent of the Baker schools, followed Mr. Hampton in leading the discussion, and the result was that a committee was appointed to discover the sentiment of the teachers in regard to the proposition.

Many Subjects Discussed.

Following on the program was an address by H. M. Dubois, principal of the La Grande high school, on the subject of "The Socialized School;" next Miss Florence Mitchell, principal of the Baker high school, on the subject, "How better to train for citizenship;" then under the head "How better to build sound bodies, health, confidence, and correct postures," A. H. Prince talked on inside work. "Vocational work every school can do" was discussed by R. A. Wilkerson, principal of Greenwood school, in this city, and he was followed by Miss Almeda Fuller, principal of the Haines schools, who led a round table discussion of "My Troubles." All these discussions were well handled and productive of many helpful and valuable ideas.

State Superintendent Speaks.
The concluding address was a talk by J. A. Churchill, of Salem, state superintendent, who discussed the legislation pertaining to educational matters which have recently been enacted by the state legislature. These were the teachers' minimum wage bill, a bill for compulsory attendance, raising the age from 14 to 16 years, and a bill for doing away with the high school fund in the state and providing for the establishment of a high school tuition fund. These all were matters regarded as very important by all persons interested in educational work.

Those who were present at the convention from outside of La Grande were the following: A. C. Strang, superintendent of the Baker schools; A. E. Crogen, principal at

Lostine; G. G. Green, superintendent of schools in Umatilla county; H. E. Inlow, superintendent of the Pendleton schools; Principal Fitzpatrick, of Milton; E. B. Hurley, principal of Imbler; W. B. Thompson, principal of Island City; Miss Winters, of Alsea; and the several visitors named in the program. Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, county superintendent of Union county, and Miss Nellie G. Neff, principal of the River school, were also in attendance.
