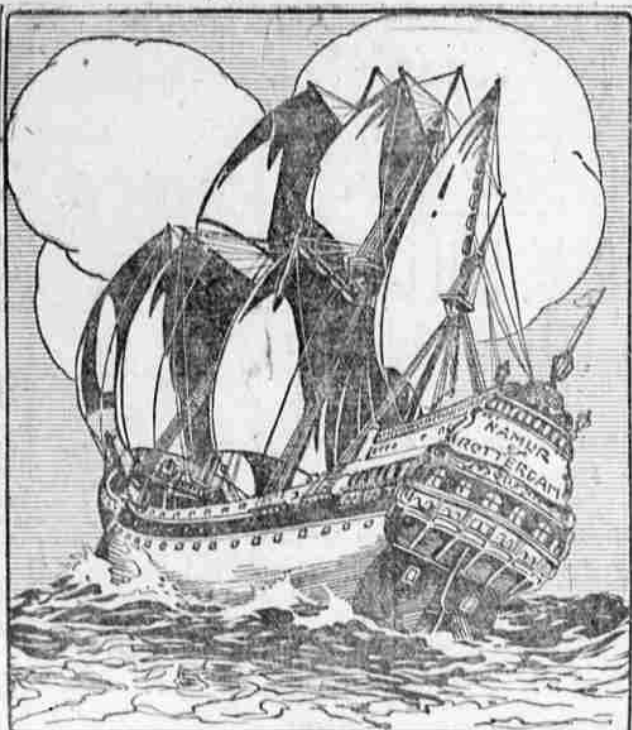

tradition and getting ready to pave their roads. He said he was pleased to return and find sentiment in this county so universally in favor of better highways. "But we can't build roads without paying for them," said the speaker, "and the sooner we realize that we are going to put in an improvement worth many times its cost the sooner will we be in shape to build highways."

Senator Colon R. Eberhard, who also represented this district in the last session, spoke on work accomplished by the session. He, like Mr. Hunter, was greatly pleased over the attitude of Union county people relative to good roads and he explained the working of the bonding law which will raise ten million dollars for state highways. "Three-fourths of this amount must be used on the Pacific highway north and south and the Columbia highway east and west throughout the state," said Senator Eberhard, "while one-fourth of the amount must be used on market roads." He paid a high tribute to the highway commission and assured everyone that the work of building the roads was positively in good hands.

F. D. McCully of Joseph was a guest at the luncheon and he told of the need of good roads through Union and Walla Walla counties. "I am with you heart and soul, and I think the people of Walla Walla county will be with you," was the closing remark of Mr. McCully.

G. W. Sully, who will speak this evening to the business men in the high school auditorium, made a few short remarks, and interspersed them with a parlor story that was happily received. He told of Ohio's road problem and how the people opposed the new movement until five miles of hard surfaced road was laid in one county. Then it was all over and now the property owners do all the road promoting themselves.

Dr. Arthur F. Bishop of Portland, late of the Spruce division, who is here to talk to the Presbyterian conference this evening, spoke of the benefit of highways and urged Union county to lead the list, rather than be behind.

Elnor Stoddard was selected as the chairman for the next Tuesday luncheon and adjournment followed.

LOVER IS BANISHED

Brick Throwing Swain Is Advised to Leave the State.

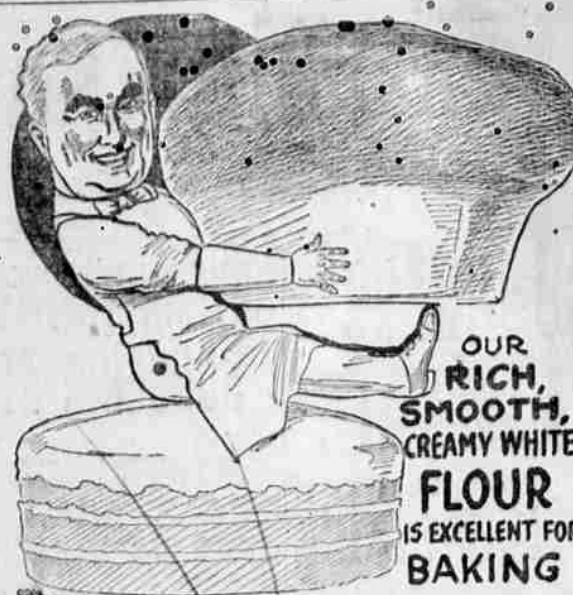
