UNION FARMERS GO AFTER SQUIRRELS

As a result of a meeting of farmers held at Union Saturday last, a squirrel poisoning campaign for that section has been outlined. Paul H. Spillman, county agriculturist, attended the meeting and he reports that there were about twenty farmers present. Ground squirrels have caused great damage to crops in various sections of the country during past years, and it is confidently expected that a campaign of this nature will be productive of good results.
The poison for the campaign at Union will be mixed in large quantities at the experiment station there and orders will be received from Frank Hall, who was appointed by the meeting to act as treasurer for that purpose. The formula used in the preparation of the poison will be the same as the government formula, which has been used with excellent results in the county for two years past.
The county agriculturist reports that other meetings of a similar nature will be held at Cove, Alsea, Imbler and other points in the valley in the near future. For a campaign against the destructive rodents to be effective, he says, it must be carried out early in the year, to prevent the natural increase of the animals.

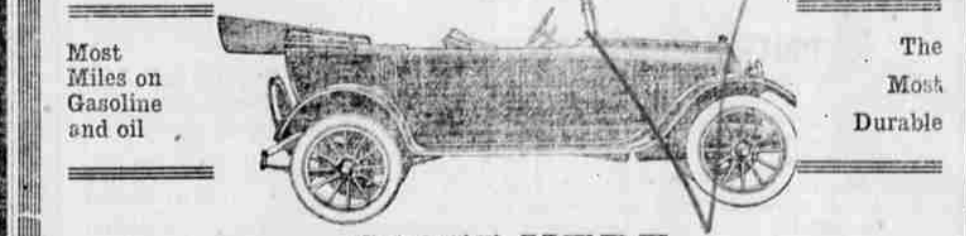
