SHERMAN COUNTY TO GET CATTLE

COUNTY AGENT SHIPS PURE
BRED BULLS FROM THIS
SECTION

C. C. Calkins, county agent from Sherman county, is shipping out six pure bred Shorthorn bulls that he has purchased for his farm. The average cattle on the farms of that section are not as good as they should be, so the county agent called together a number of farmers who had shown some interest in better stock and formed a bull association. These farmers keep but a few head of stock each, but they realized that better stock be more profitable than the class of stuff they are keeping at the present time. At the time of their meeting they decided that they would use pure bred Shorthorns and instructed their agents to secure the required animals for them. Union county is becoming well known for its pure bred beef cattle and so he naturally acquired as to the possibility of securing what they needed in this section. After inspecting the local herds he finally bought six head of yearling bulls, from the following parties: G. W. Delany, Hot Lake, Ore.; W. J. Towley, Hot Lake, Ore.; W. E. Green, Union, Ore.; Sherman and Hutchinson, two. This will be the first shipment of local bulls to Sherman county. While here Mr. Calkins also inspected the Hereford herd of Blockland Bros., and was very much impressed with what he saw at this ranch.

UP-TO-DATE MUSIC

Theatre Orchestra Sits on Elevator
Which Rises From Below.

Tally's theatre, Los Angeles, Cal., is equipped with a mechanical orchestra pit which brings on the orchestra and takes it out again without all the fuss and commotion that usually attends the ducking in and out of musicians through the little door under the stage.

The mechanical orchestra pit is nothing more than a large flat-topped plunger type elevator. The platform is lowered to the basement, and there the musicians, with their complete equipment, get on board. When it is time for the music a button is pressed and the orchestra rises silently into the view of the audience. Likewise, during parts of the performance in which no music is needed the orchestra drops out of sight so quickly that the audience seldom notices that it is gone.

What would happen to any musician who did not arrive in time for the rising is puzzling. There is apparently no trapdoor in the pit, through which he might crawl, so most likely he would have to wait patiently below for the platform to make its next trip. "The mechanical pit cost \$15,000," says the owner of the theatre. "It's cost of operation is trivial when compared with its value as an asset to the playhouse."—Popular Science Monthly.

"THE SERVICE STAR" CARRIES LOYALTY MESSAGE TO WORLD

Are you, who have not been called to fight for the nation, doing all you can for the dependents of those who have? Don't you feel that they need your help and that what you do for them you are doing for your glorious country? "The Service Star," Madge Kennedy's latest Goldwyn production, though in no sense a war picture, carries that message to all humanity.

This thrilling and realistic drama of the hour shows how women are bringing happiness to the homes where little service flags in the window tell of great sacrifices for the nation, and how they leave nothing undone to prove to these heroic mothers that everything possible will be done to help them and their sons at the front or in the camps.

The locale of "The Service Star" is a prosperous farming section that has given liberally of its sturdy sons to the cause of democracy. Several war service societies, composed mainly of young women, and including a Red Cross division and a women's loyalty league, are shown at work on sweaters, socks and wristlets for our boys.

Madge Kennedy, as Marilyn March, who gives up her work as the town's librarian to help her patriotic sisters of the Red Cross, is shown directing the labors of her co-workers in the local workrooms. Eager to become a member of the loyalty league, Marilyn forges the name of an aviator when in a letter to her, as his secret bride, in order to join, as only wives, sweethearts and sisters of men in the service are eligible. So intensely patriotic and eager to serve is this good girl that she remains a criminal, deception to gain her end.

Later, when a new draft increment is shown leaving for camp, Marilyn and other members of the loyalty league are seen surrounding and chatting cheerfully with a batch of G. I. soldiers who are at the depot to see the nation's defenders leave for war as they themselves had done more than 100 days ago. Everything that tends to show how well the women of America are doing their part toward winning the war is visualized in "The Service Star," which comes to the screen at the theatre today and tomorrow.
