## BAPTIST LAYMEN WILL MEET HERE

The financial objective for the church in America is \$8,000,000.

There will also be meetings Thursday at 10:00 a. m. and at 2:00 and 7:30 p. m. There will also be a men's banquet Thursday evening.

The speakers at the convention will be Dr. T. S. Kirtley, of Seattle; Dr. A. M. Petty, of Portland; A. H. Bailey, of Spokane; and A. B. Minaker, of Idaho.
