ARIZONA VET RETURNS

Plains "Bill" Davidson Was With Roosevelt at San Juan Hill and Also Fought the Hun.

PHOENIX, AZA, March 11.—William Davidson, plain "Bill" to his friends, has arrived in Phoenix from Phoenix. His return was a most interesting one. He was a member of the 10th Cavalry, which was under the command of General Wood. He has been through a battle in which he says 1000 men fell of 1200 who went over the top.

Bill, who had fought under Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and John C. Greenway, arrived in Phoenix from his Arizona headquarters ostensibly to take part in a farewell to Captain, now Lieutenant Colonel Greenway, who had abandoned his post of general manager of the Calumet & Arizona Copper company to go to the front in a regiment of engineers.

The older veterans wanted to go, too, but his years barred him. However, on the train between Bisbee and El Paso Greenway came across Bill, who explained that he was making a short trip to the border. Somewhere between El Paso and Chicago the engineer officer again found Bill on the train and again between Chicago and New York, where Bill dropped out of sight temporarily. And then, in some way as yet unexplained, aboard the ship which carried Greenway and the regiment of engineers to France, the colonel saw a man from the stockhold who looked familiar even beneath his grime and who, when he grinned, unquestionably was Bill.

None but the colonel and Bill know the whole story, but Bill says he went through the war with the colonel. They were but a few feet apart when a shell dropped and sent Bill to the hospital with a badly torn arm. They were not far apart when the colonel was gassed at the head of his men, the place he fought. Out of one three-day fight the colonel

and Bill came back with 200 men of the 100th started against the Germans.

When invited home the colonel arrived in New York in time to go to the funeral services over the body of the man he had followed up San Juan Hill, Theodore Roosevelt, and with Bill he was one of the dozen former rough riders who stood at the Roosevelt Hill graveside.

Bill was with the colonel at Hot Springs and just to encourage him in the continued practice of the baths he took as many as he did. He even took to golf as a means of setting the pace for the Greenway exercise. When he saw his colonel safely in the hands of the army medical staff at Fort Worth, Tex., Bill came alone to Phoenix. Those who have known him for years calculate he got here in time to miss the fuss staged at Douglas and Bisbee to welcome Colonel Greenway home.

Now Bill is on his way to his Alo home, where he probably will go back to mining, the pursuit which enabled him to raise \$10,000 on short notice in 1917 so that he might keep close to the colonel.

WANT 14,000 MARINES

Great Opportunities to See the World Are Offered.

The United States Marine Corps still offers an excellent opportunity to the adventurous youth to see the world, and 14,000 such men are wanted to enlist in its ranks during the coming year.

The present strength of the Marine Corps is 67,000 officers and men, on 12,000 of whom called for the regular four year period. The peace strength of the Marine Corps has been set by congress at 26,000, leaving 14,000 men to be recruited during the coming year.

There are opportunities for new recruits to be sent on interesting duties to Guam, Manila and other island possessions of the U. S., and in other various parts of the world.

Men who successfully pass the physical examinations are transferred to the training station at Mare Island Navy Yard, California, where they receive their training, and after spending fourteen weeks, in the recruit school are eligible for transfer to any place in the world where Marines are serving. Chances for promotion are exceptionally good at this time, owing to the fact that many men are being discharged who were enlisted only for the duration of the war.
