LOAN QUOTA NOT TO BE CHANGED BY STAMP SALES

Director of War Savings Alters
Original Plan of Hing-
ing Two Securities

Victory Liberty Loan quotas will not be affected by Thrift Stamp sales as planned by the Treasury Department for the first of the year. It was announced last January by Lewis D. Franklin, director of war savings, that whenever Thrift Stamp quotas were exceeded the amount of over-subscription would be taken from the coming loan quota and that if the Thrift Stamp quotas were not reached the deficiency would be added to the loan quota.

Governor James K. Lynch of the Federal Reserve Bank has just received a telegram from Washington advising that the plan to adjust Victory Loan quotas in accordance with the sale of War Savings Stamps has been abandoned. The reason given was that some of the Federal Reserve Districts were not reappportioning Thrift Stamp quotas.

French War Orphans.

PENDLETON, March 12.—When the pupils of the Lincoln school yesterday morning pledged themselves to adopt thirty-five French war orphans, they established a record for speed in the opinion of Miss Franchlyn, official speaker for the fatherless children of France, who addressed the school.

"I have never seen such a splendid spirit," said Miss Franchlyn. "I have sent in the announcement to head-quarters so that they may see what Pendleton children are doing."

It is the children themselves who will give the money for the support of the French, says Miss Della Rush, principal of the school. One little girl has given up the idea of buying a ukelele, while another has pledged herself to give up candy.

LAND OF EASY MONEY

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—"America—the land of easy money," is the way Tatsuko Kozugi, Japanese millionaire, described this country. Kozugi who says he is a business man without a business, has made seven trips to the United States, and on every trip he goes away thousands of dollars richer. "I just keep my eyes open," he replied when asked how he did it, in his apartments at the St. Francis Hotel one morning. "It is no trick at all to make money in this country. I am a little surprised there are not more millionaires here. I have regular business, but every time I arrive here some new opportunity seems to swirl me."

Kozugi has been here since last June and travelled in most of the western states. He has spent his last few months in southern California. He makes a strong plea for expansion of the Japanese empire. "We have sixty million people and no place to put them," he declares.

SCHOOL TIMBER

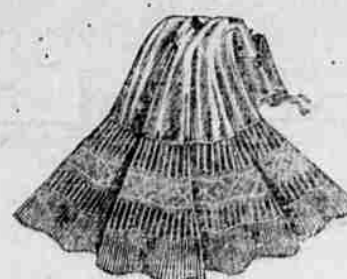
Idaho Agricultural College Holdings
Worth \$30,000,000.

MOSCOW, Ida., March 12.—That the timber owned by the University of Idaho and its kindred branches, including the various schools and the agricultural college, is worth, at present prices, more than \$30,000,000, is the statement made today by Dean F. G. Miller, head of the department of forestry. The university probably is the largest holder of timber lands in Idaho, with the exception of the state.
