Meat: Russia and the Allies

Russia crumbled away and failed the Allies largely through lack of food, according to an American eyewitness.

With plentiful reserves and resources virtually untouched, her people starved at home and at the front because there was no adequate organization to place food where it was needed.

Animals on the hoof were shipped thousands of miles to the various fronts, wasting transportation facilities required for other purposes. They arrived shrunken and emaciated, to be killed and dressed amidst filth and confusion behind the lines. Half of those brought from Siberia, it is said, perished on the way; many more were unfit for food.

On the other hand, the American packers turned live stock into meat in large sanitary plants located in the producing sections, and shipped the product under refrigeration so that it reached the trenches in France in perfect condition, without waste.

MUST NOT DODGE

Income Tax Returns Are Expected on the Designated Date

"A person who waits for an income tax man to pull his door bell or his coat-tails, may find himself a delinquent subject to severe penalties," is the warning sounded today by the internal revenue bureau officials. "The duty of getting the payments and the returns in by March 15th, lies solely with each individual and corporation liable under the law." The bureau has sent every man it can spare directly to the people to aid in an advisory capacity, said Commissioner Roper. "But our men have no time to canvass people at work or in their homes. Every person liable to a tax or a return must take the initiative in performing the duties required by the revenue law. If he needs information, blank forms, or advice, he should seek an income tax officer. The big thing now in income tax is to get the first payment in between now and March 15th. That is the due date under the new law. Frankly speaking, the government needs the money to meet its obligations falling due on that date. The returns of 1918 income are due at the same time. Either a complete return showing the true tax, or a tentative return of the estimated tax, must accompany each and every payment made between now and March 15th. The tentative return of estimated tax is a relief measure adopted by the bureau for tax-payers who cannot complete their full returns on time. A tax-payer who needs additional time for making a return cannot be relieved of the payment of the tax due or the estimated tax due. But, on making the required payment between now and March 15th, the tax-payer can secure further time up to forty-five days in which to file the complete return. The bureau in this way meets the convenience of tax-payers who are pressed for time, but it cannot relieve them of the requirement that their taxes due on March 15th must be paid between now and the due date.

It is urged that every tax-payer who can do so, make payment in full when filing his return. This method will greatly aid the revenue offices and relieve the tax-payer of the necessity of guarding against oversight on future installment dates. In each case where payment in full is not made, the first payment must be at least one-fourth of the total tax due, or at least one-fourth of the estimated tax due. No matter which of these methods is used in paying taxes due March 15th, the payment must actually be in the collector's office by the due date, accompanied by a return.

CHINA ANNOUNCES STAND

Government Railways Only Excluded From Internationalization.

PEKIN, March 13.—It was announced today by the Chinese minister of communications that the government would agree to the internationalization of the Shantung, South Manchurian, Chinese Eastern and French Yunnan railways, but would object to the internationalization of railways under Chinese government control. Japanese opposition to the internationalization of those railways still is maintained.

FESTIVAL OF PURIM

Jewish Holiday Falls on the 16th Day of March This Year.

Purim, the festival of "lots" falls on March 16 this year. It is one of the most popular among the Jewish great days, and deservedly holds first rank among merry-making events of the year. The history connected with Purim is that of Esther and loyal Mordecai, who defied the mighty king of Persia to save their people from destruction. Regardless of the absolute historicity of the Book of Esther, Purim warns veneration from both orthodox and reform Jews for its earnest appeal to hold faith in a high power and that historical progress, material greatness is to be sacrificed and forgotten when one's friends are in danger. Nowhere is the solidarity of the Jew for the purpose of bringing God's truths to earth so well illustrated as in the simple story of Esther, and a serious moral lies beneath the popular light vein that the festival possesses.

WANTS WORLD PARLIAMENT

Swiss Meeting Would Have Organization Based on Population.

BERNE, March 13.—The League of Nations conference in session here adopted a resolution proposing the institution of a world parliament as the supreme authority of the League of Nations. Each country would send delegates to the parliament at the ratio of one to each one million in population. The conference adopted unanimously a resolution presented by neutrals favoring the release of all prisoners of war. It also adopted a resolution favoring the establishment of an international colonial office for the control of all colonies not self-governing.

ALASKA MOVING PICTURES

ANCHORAGE, Alas., March 13.—Motion pictures will visually to persons in the United States the construction and operating work and agricultural activities along the route of the government railroad in Alaska. Nine thousand two hundred and forty feet of film have been sent from Anchorage to Washington D. C. and after exhibition to administration officials, senators and representatives in congress, the film will be shown on screens in various parts of the country.

Most of the pictures were taken last fall at the time of the visit of E. O. McCormick, chairman, and members of the federal commission appointed by President Wilson to investigate the resources of Alaska, particularly along the line of the government railroad.

The scenes depict construction and operation of the railroad route from Seward to Indian river, which is 150 miles north of Anchorage, include farming development in the Matanuska Valley, and show coal mining at Eka and Chisoon.

WIRELESS PHONES BOUGHT

SPOKANE, March 12.—Purchase of 10 wireless telephones for use of fire patrols in national forests of district No. 1, comprising eastern Washington, northern Idaho and western Montana was announced here today by Roscoe Haines, supervisor of the St. Joe National Forest in northern Idaho, at a conference of large timber owners of the district with forestry officials.

Mr. Haines said the telephones, which he expected to be in operation in the near future, will have a working radius of 25 to 100 miles and probably will be installed in the more isolated districts, such as the Clearwater and Selway forests.

He said he thought it probable that one or two of the ten hydro-planes recently acquired by the forest service will be assigned to this district for the coming season.

WILL TEST GUERNSEYS

Purebreds to Be Sent to Dairy Districts in Vicinity of Astoria.

CORVALLIS, March 13.—A herd of 25 registered Guernsey cattle has been given the Oregon Agricultural college by W. B. Ayer of Portland, former federal food administrator for Oregon, and owner of the Foot-hill farm at Carlton. The college herd is now one of the largest among those maintained by agricultural colleges of the country—100 head. The value of the gift is estimated at between \$7500 and \$10,000, but to the state it is expected it will be worth many times that amount.

"The college is most appreciative of this special gift by Mr. Ayer," said President W. J. Kerr. "The cows include a number of the best Guernseys on the Pacific coast. They are a valuable addition to the college herds. It is the plan of the dairy department to have a herd of 15 cows of each important breed.

Fifteen of the best Guernseys included in the gift by Mr. Ayer will be kept at the college as representatives of that breed. Eleven will be loaned temporarily to the branch experiment station at Astoria for the purpose of establishing purebred Guernseys in that district. Heretofore, only grade cattle have been demonstrated in that part of the state. The introduction of purebred Guernseys will be of great value in the development of the dairy industry in that section."

MINING MEN TO MEET

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 13.—Mining men from many parts of Canada and the United States are expected to attend the International Mining Convention to be held here March 17, 18, and 19, according to the local mining officials who are arranging for the meeting.

T. A. Richard, San Francisco, mining-safety editor, student and traveler, will be one of the principal speakers at the meeting. He will talk on "Mining as an Investment." Mr. Richard, it is said here, is known in nearly every mining community on the globe, having spent years journeying and visiting mines.

Other addresses will be delivered by T. W. Buray and Valentine Quinn, two Vancouver men, on "Mining Taxation." Dean Moscow of the University of Idaho, also probably will speak.

H. N. Lawrie, chairman of the Oregon Bureau of Mines has sent word that he intends to come to the convention with his entire staff. A big delegation is expected from Seattle and other Puget Sound cities. Exhibits from many parts of Canada and Alaska are to be sent to the convention.

A strike of carpenters and painters at Pendleton has stopped all building operations. The men want 80 cents an hour.

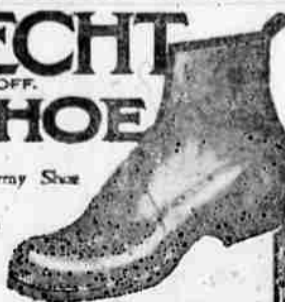

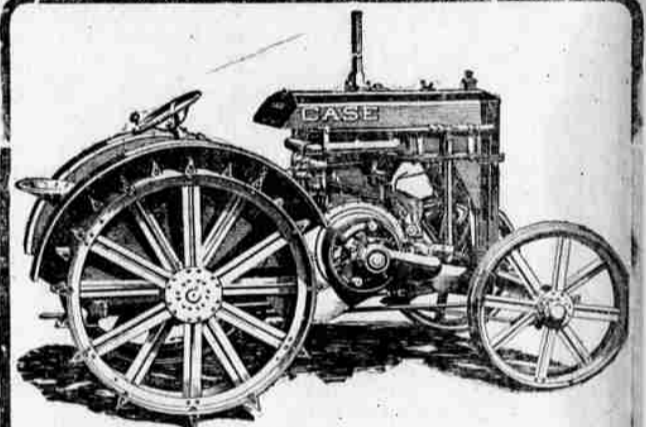
