German's Love Wavers Between Spills and Maiden in Soldier's War.

The Barrage, a newspaper "put over" by the 18th field artillery, American army of occupation, at Pohl, Germany, prints this story. There was quite a commotion up at the railroad station one morning this past week. A young woman entered the station, followed by a gallant German carrying a basket of potatoes. Suddenly the latter dropped the basket and embraced the young woman, she emitting an earthy scream. The M. P. on duty finally separated the wooed and wooer. Friendly hands then gathered up the potatoes, which were thereupon confiscated by a large, distinguished looking German in gray uniform who is "chief of police."

A few minutes later there was a second commotion. The gallant Hun was, lying upon the ground kicking around in what appeared to be either an epileptic fit or a sad case of alcoholism. He became more violent and it took three M. P. to hold him. Finally he became quiet and arose. The girl, who had been an interested spectator, tenderly placed his hat upon his head and brushed the mud from his clothing.

The lover then remembered about the basket of potatoes and threatened to land a knockout on the chief of police, twice his size. After much persuasion upon the part of the excited Germans, he finally regained possession of the potatoes and Romeo and Juliet boarded the train at Coblenz.
