

OFFICE NOT TO REMAIN CLOSED

EMPLOYMENT SERVICE WILL BE REESTABLISHED

La Grande Office Closed Down for the Present and is Awaiting Developments at Capitol.

The local office of the United States Employment bureau, conducted under the Government Department of Labor, along with seven other similar offices in the state will be closed on March 22nd. The employment service is to be discontinued throughout the whole United States, due to the failure of congress to pass the deficiency bill with the exception of about fifty offices which are to be maintained in the large industrial centers. One office, that in Portland, is to continue in Oregon, but even their working force is to be reduced and the work handicapped to a great extent.

It is believed that the local office will be closed only temporarily and that congress will pass appropriations at the next session, which will insure the continuance of the service. This next session of congress may be in May, and these appropriations no doubt will be acted upon soon after they convene.

The office in La Grande was not established until last October, for late in the season to be of any use to the majority of employers throughout Union and Wallawa counties, but did do considerable in placing men in the lumber industries during the winter months. The real usefulness of the service and of the local office was just beginning, as spring work increased the demand for labor and employers were putting their applications for help through the service.

Fortunately, a bureau for the replacement of soldiers and sailors was organized under the direction of the local community labor and the department of labor, some time ago, and the brunt of work in finding work for the returning men will no doubt fall upon the members of this bureau, who have volunteered their services for such work. If the unemployment problem increases to such an extent that the bureau cannot handle it, then the city and community will be called upon for aid.

CONVENTION OF BAPTISTS OVER

The Baptists Laymen of Union and Wallawa counties were encouraged by the inspiring address of the victory team, in conference here Wednesday and Thursday.

Mr. Joseph Ward of La Grande, was moderator and manager for the local conference, and is to be congratulated on the success attained.

The pulse of the conference was evident in the spirit of such appeals as:

"We have won the war, we must win the world." "The only world's democracy worth having is a democracy of the brotherhood of man." "The whole world is awakening to a new day of righteousness." This victory drive is but a part of a mighty moral and spiritual wave invading the world. "Methodists, Presbyterians, Congregationalists are in this great drive for righteousness." "The doors of opportunity for service throughout the world are not only open, they are nailed open for Baptists efforts."

The closing address was made by Dr. Kirtley, of Seattle, who eloquently appeals to the spirit of sacrifice in the service of men with our money and to historic demonstration at principles.

In the afternoon session on Thursday Mr. Minaker, of Idaho, led a discussion on Baptist enterprises, showing the expenditure of millions, now unified under one budget for the first time.

Dr. A. M. Petty gave the address on "World Wide Mission." He declared that the drive for six million dollars now is the demand put up to us by the unchristian world. Hospitals, surgeons, schools, teachers, workers, missionaries and building enterprises on an increased scale must be supplied and undertaken merely to meet the present demand confronting us.

At the banquet in the evening, Miss Capper, representing the Women's missionary work, gave a comprehensive address on the "World's Obligation to Missions and Christian Effort."

The closing address was made by Mr. Minaker on "The Church the Body of Christ." He urged upon the laymen that they would only know Christ through the hands and feet, the Christlike service of the individual.

IS WELL KNOWN HORSEWOMAN

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 15.—Mrs. Herbert Wadsworth, a well known horsewoman, has been appointed a specialist in horse husbandry in the U. S. department of agriculture, and as a representative of the department will continue her work with the Genesee Valley (New York) Horse Breeders' Association, which she organized. Mrs. Wadsworth's work in assisting farmers of the Genesee Valley in raising better horses, and the support she has given the Livingston county (New York) fair impressed officials of the Federal Agricultural and War departments as being so practical that when she requested the co-operation of the department of agriculture in her enterprise it was immediately granted. The department of agriculture feels that the sort of work Mrs. Wadsworth has done should be encouraged because it is materially improving the horse-breeding industry in that section of New York. In addition to directing the work of the association in the Genesee Valley,

Mrs. Wadsworth is successfully managing an estate of 11,000 acres.

When this New York horsewoman first interested the farmers in Genesee Valley in better horses, she obtained a number of high-class thoroughbred stallions, some of which had good racing careers. These were placed in the hands of local farmers, who got the service for taking care of the stallions. She also placed high-class mares with farmers on easy terms to build up their stock. As horses were selected for good dispositions, good conformation, soundness, bone and size.

As a result of her work, Mrs. Wadsworth has demonstrated the value of thoroughbred horses, and now many farmers in the Genesee Valley use horses in their daily work which are half or even entirely thoroughbreds. The improvement of horses brought about by the Genesee Valley Breeders' Association has not been surpassed by any similar association in the United States, say officials of the federal department. In addition to giving expert advice and counsel in horse breeding, Mrs. Wadsworth has assisted the members in finding a market for their high-class animals.

Mrs. Wadsworth has also taken a great interest in the Livingston county fair, held at Avon, N. Y. Last year at this fair \$2,550 was offered as prizes in the breeding class.

es for colts sired by thoroughbred stallions and more bred to thoroughbred stallions. These prizes were open to competition of all farmers in the county, whether members of the Breeders' Association or not. However, all members of the Breeders' Association are required to show their colts unless especially exempted. A large number of premiums were offered in each class so that all good entries received recognition.

It will be remembered that Mrs. Wadsworth has frequently proved her ability as a horsewoman by long distance rides. Her ride in 1910 is a world's record. She rode 212 miles in twenty hours, including all stops, the actual riding time being 15 hours, 20 minutes. She used 12 horses in all; 4 of them being young horses which had been broken the previous spring. It was a coincidence that this ride was undertaken at a time when all army officers of field rank were required to demonstrate their ability as horsemen by riding 80 miles in three consecutive days.
