CATTLE THEFT IS THE CHARGE

WALTER PIERCE SWEARS OUT
WARRANT FOR F. GABHART

Rider has Been Trusted Man of
Mr. Pierce for Many Years—Ac-
cused Man is in Jail.

Charged with stealing live stock from his employer Frank Gabhart well known cattle raiser, is in jail awaiting investigation by the grand jury.

Gabhart has rode the Eastern Oregon range for many years and a long time has been the trusted employe of Walter M. Pierce, who is one of the largest cattle operators in Eastern Oregon.

No one could have made Mr. Pierce believe that Gabhart was not faithful and that his herds were being looked after with the greatest care during his absence.

But the proof came and then in company with the sheriff, Mr. Pierce began investigations that caused his faith in Gabhart to be shaken and ultimately caused him to furnish the information upon which a warrant was issued for the man of the range.

"I am heartbroken over this matter," said Walter M. Pierce, "of course I do not like to lose my calves but on top of that is the shaken confidence which I am forced to undergo in Gabhart. I would have bet my last dollar on that fellow and believed in him thoroughly."

This rude awakening came to Gabhart occasionally for not long ago a big stockman in Baker county had a similar experience. He had a man whom he thought was good against any temptation and he gave him free hand with the range cattle. It was learned later that this man was supplying a number of mining camps with trail beef, that a few isolated ranchers had materially increased their cattle holdings by changing the brand and all had been arranged and sold by the same rider.

The law relative to brands on cattle and the stealing of cattle in Oregon are very severe and when a person is caught in the toils of the cattle laws he is up against a serious problem.

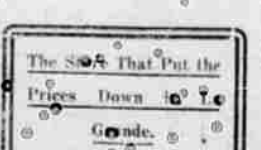
