WALLOWA IS STRONG FOR GOOD ROADS

duce great numbers of live stock which should not be allowed to go to waste markets, in the opinion of the speaker, and his statement that goods roads built through the counties of Union and Wallowa would turn this vast trade in this direction was heartily applauded.

The also, Mr. Hoke declared, in proving a valuable asset to the mar raising cattle in a dry farming district, and he saw great success ahead of the man who puts cattle on dry farmed land and provides silage for their feed. The cost of feeding silage, he said, is just about half the cost of feeding hay and grain.

Mr. Hoke predicted that in five years Wallowa county will be leading the state in productivity, unless Union and the rest of them trays ahead faster than they are doing. The farmers there are going strongly into the raising of pure bred cattle, he said, and in the last six months recently breeders have been shipping in pure bred black cattle. One hundred bulls have been bought in Union county since last fall, but Mr. Hoke sees the day not far ahead when Union county farmers will be buying their bulls from the breeders of Wallowa. The man who is raising pure bred stock, he claims, makes two dollars to the one made by the man who has only grade animals. He claimed for his county one of the best ranges in the northwest. **His Union County's Best.**

Mr. Hoke mentioned as Wallowa's greatest asset her people, and he drew a laugh when he said Union county's best citizens had seen the rosy light of her future and gone there to live. He sounded a note of the spirit of co-operation when he declared that the future of Union and Wallowa counties is wrapped up in each other. On the good road proposition, he assured his hearers that Wallowa is with Union county in the movement and waiting for the business men here to start the movement on its way, when they will help carry it along.

Other Business Handled.
A little other business was handled at the luncheon today. The report of Wm. Miller on the proposed re-organization of the Commercial Club was presented by Mr. Miller, who submitted a code of by-laws. The by-laws were accepted by unanimous vote.

Chairman Crowe selected Howard O'Brien to act as chairman of the luncheon next Tuesday.

RUSSIANS ARE IN BAD FIX

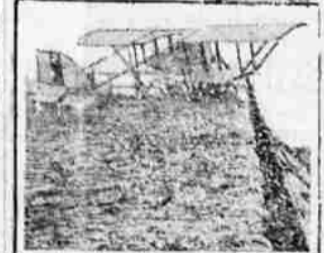
In the Present Situation There is Little Hope of Allied Aid.

VLADIVOSTOCK, March 18.—The Russian nation follows with a harsh feeling of bitterness all the efforts for creating a league of nations," declares Dr. Vaclav Girsa, local member of the Czech national council. "It comprehends with difficulty how the allied democracies can entertain this noble but rather distant idea, and at the same time look quietly on at what is transpiring in Russia," continued Dr. Girsa.
"Russia today is in need of assistance. First of all she needs reorganization of her railroads. Nevertheless any form of assistance to Russia is imaginable only in conjunction with a military expedition which would be able to guarantee that the underlaking will not be destroyed by pernicious rebellions and disorders which have become chronic along the Siberian rail ways.
"In order, however, that such military intervention and economic assistance shall succeed, it is necessary to carry it out according to a clearly defined plan, that is to say, the removal of the Bolshevik government from Russia, the re-establishment and maintenance of order and peace throughout the country up to the time when it will be possible for the Russian people to constitute for themselves, freely and without coercion, their desired form of government. Such allied intervention will be accepted with exultation and with full confidence by all notwithstanding its even more efficient in interfering with internal Russian affairs."
Adherence to the principle of non interference with Russian internal affairs, he said, prevent the allies from supporting either the Siberian government or the government of the Ufa directorate because of lack of assurance that either constituted a government having the confidence of the nation. Similarly, he pointed out, neither of these governments, even with the best programs they could devise, were able to win the confidence of the nation because they lacked the support of the allies. The result is a deadlock and a situation affording fertile ground for new revolutions calculated to strengthen Bolshevism by driving into their ranks the wavering left-socialists.

Trinidad Lizard Farm.

GIVEN HIGH HONOR

Stanford Athletic Director Placed in Charge of Dress.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 18.—To be chosen by General Pershing as athletic director of the world's greatest military camp, the United States debarcation center at Ft. Ord, is the honor which has fallen to the lot of a Stanford athlete, Captain Harry Maloney, of San Mateo, according to information reaching Albert G. Bagley, director of the western department War Activities Knights of Columbus, yesterday.

Maloney, during ten years' athletic work at Stanford, has won the respect of all branches of sport which stood him in good stead when his Uncle Sam called him to come. Commissioned a cavalry captain at the first training camp, he was assigned to Stanford's coach-laster to Major Bugge, new commandant at West Point. When General Pershing sent for Bugge, Maloney was placed in charge of the military work at Stanford, and the Cardinal institution ranked with the four universities especially singled out for the excellence of their military training.

HUN STEAMSHIPS TO BE UTILIZED FOR HOMECOMERS

Americans to Return From France in German Liners, Which Will Take Back Purchased Food.

PARIS, March 18.—Before long the newly-leased German liners will carry 35,000 doughboys back to the United States westward trip.

This is one of the results of the agreement reached at Brussels with Germany by which the allies will see her food forthwith. It is a business deal, pure and simple, without sentiment.

"Are the Germans really starving," Mr. Hoover was asked.
"Every German gets some food," he replied, "thanks to the efficient system of distribution. But our investigators have learned that large portions of the population are suffering from malnutrition which causes other diseases and death. Starvation is a gradual process."

A German request to borrow money from the entente countries such as a loan. This means Germany will get food on a cash basis only. Nothing will be "choked up."

Though lacking food Germany has lots of gold stored away. Her available public funds being larger than the British gold holdings and more than one-half of the American fund when the war started.

Within two days Germany will deposit \$25,000,000 worth of gold in a Belgian bank at Brussels, then \$25,000,000 within 15 days, against a credit which will be used to pay the various allies for food delivered to the Germans.

The first shipment will include 70,000 tons of fats, which Germany needs most, and later shipments will contain 30,000 tons of pork, 50,000 tons of beans, the same amount of rice, and 50,000 tons of breadstuffs monthly.

American will supply flour, British rice and beans and France nuts for oils, which the Germans turn into margarine. Some supplies already are available at Copenhagen and Rotterdam, notably 75,000 tons of breadstuffs.

The remainder will come from various ports. Ultimately, Germany will replace the gold deposits with:

- 1. Shipping leased to the allies.
- 2. Raw materials, such as lumber, potash and coal.
- 3. Manufactures needed by the allies, such as dyes.

"Dumping," however, will not be allowed. The Germans will be unable to stiffle French competitors whose plants were deliberately destroyed by the Germans in the war. France needs coal, England needs lumber, and the United States needs potash. In return for these things the Germans will get food.

Next to gold for raw material, Germany will pay through the sale of her holdings in foreign securities, and through credits which she may establish in neutral countries to whom the allies owe money. The Scandinavian countries owe Germany money for coal, while France owes the Scandinavian nations for paper pulp.
