IT'S A DIRTY SHAME'
Say Doughboys of Dry Election During Absence of Soldiers.

Ohio soldiers in the American expeditionary forces are up in arms over the adoption of prohibition in Ohio, according to a letter received by Cincinnati friends from Herman Gillespie, Park hotel, College hill, who is in France with company C, 147th infantry, says the Cincinnati Enquirer.

"The boys of the A. E. F. are sore about the state going dry; they say it is a dirty shame to take advantage of us while we are away fighting for our country and our liberty, then have our liberty taken away from us, and to make things worse they want to take our tobacco from us," he writes. "Why don't they leave us here to starve and let the slackers run the country to hell? If you want to have this published you will be doing the A. E. F. boys a favor."

Gillespie writes that he has gained twenty-five pounds while in the army and has traveled over most of France and a part of Belgium. He now is stationed at St. Paul, France, awaiting an order to entrain for this country with the 37th division.

CHRISTIAN TEAM DROPS OUT OF CHURCH LEAGUE
There will be a regular battle on Wednesday night at the Y. M. C. A., when the M. I. A. and the Presbyterians come together for their first basketball game of the church league.
