REGARDING THE WELFARE OF THE SOLDIERS

In view of the many inquiries that are being made concerning the welfare of soldiers in the American expeditionary forces, the war department has recently instituted a courier service between America and France to get information desired. This has been done because the quick demobilization of the army and the rapid change from place to place of different units have made it almost impossible for the Red Cross in France to follow up all inquiries satisfactorily. In cases where there is doubt concerning reports that a man has been wounded, in fact in all similar cases, the bureau of communication at national headquarters in Washington, D. C., will continue to handle inquiries, but "straight, well-founded inquiries" should in future, be made to the adjutant general, war department, Washington, D. C. in stead of to the Red Cross.

Messrs. Hogg and Maloney Will Be at Postoffice Building From March 24 to 29.

Milton A. Miller, internal revenue collector for Oregon, sends out the following notice:

"By direction of the commissioner of internal revenue I am authorized again to station my deputies at various points throughout the state to assist those who failed to complete income tax returns within the required time, and to render any other service that may be necessary or desired. And adjustments of income taxes should be made now, as an extensive 'drive' for delinquents will soon be undertaken."

"Income Tax Officers Hogg and Maloney will be at the post office building at La Grande, Oregon, from and including March 24 to and including March 29, 1919."

"It is the wish of the department that every one interested should take advantage of the opportunity afforded by the visit of these officers."
