They will forfeit their property to the city and have to go to a sale.

#### Repeal of Ordinance Asked

L. C. Smith, local garage man, appeared to ask the board to repeal a city ordinance making it an offense to run a tractor or vehicle with horns or spikes on the wheels, over the pavements. Mr. Smith stated that he would be receiving large numbers of tractors this season, and as his garage is in the center of the city, it is impossible for him to get the machines there without driving on the pavements. The man of plan, King the street, he said, was not practical and he thought the city could revise the ordinance so as to allow a machine of the weight of the ones he handles to be run on the pavements. He pointed out also that, with the steady increase in the number of tractors used by farmers around the country, there will be many occasions when the machines must be brought in here for repairs, or else go to another town. It was suggested that in the summer months, when the heat of the sun softens the pavements so as to make them liable to injury by the tractors, the machines might be allowed to run in the early hours of the morning. No definite action was taken on the matter, except to leave it over for consideration until next week. The city attorney and the city manager were instructed to look into Mr. Smith's request. Commissioner McKennon, with the idea of getting action, voted to repeal the ordinance entirely, but the motion failed to carry.

#### Dumping Ground Wanted

The fact that the city is in need of a new site for a dumping ground was pointed out by the city manager. The lease on the present site expires shortly and the citizens in the neighborhood object to having it renewed. The commissioners and the city manager will have a look around for a possible location before their next meeting.

#### Dogs May Run This Summer

The ordinance requiring that owners of dogs who keep their canine friends in the city must keep them up from April 1st during the summer, was voted repealed last night by the commission. The city attorney was instructed to draft a new ordinance covering the motion and present it at the next meeting. All sportsmen in the city who keep dogs will be well pleased with the city's action in this respect. They claim that the city should now take action to prevent the depredations of cats in the neighborhood. The cats, they say, do more harm to the gardens than do the dogs, and the destruction of bird life caused by both stray and pet felines in the spring and summer seasons is something that demands drastic action.

### JOY RIDERS STEAL CAR

Three young fellows who have not yet been apprehended took a Studebaker Six automobile from in front of the W. D. Lock room, here on Fourth street about 9 o'clock last night and made a clean getaway. They had several hours of fun joy riding and finally abandoned the car on a side street, where it was found early this morning. The whole police force and the deputy sheriff searched most of the night for the thieves, but did not succeed in locating either them or the car. It is reported in the owner this morning by a citizen.

The car was owned by the Wallace Milling Company, who have recently engaged Studebaker agency in La Grande. It had just been taken in by them in a deal with J. D. Smith, and Mr. Smith's license number, 5, was on the car. The machine was not damaged by the joy riders.

A. H. Prince, who lives on Fourth street, saw the theft as he was going home last night. The thieves pushed the car by hand for a block and then jumped in, started the motor, and were on their way. The speed at which they went, says Prince, was well acquainted with the Studebaker gears and control. Mr. Prince, who through his work as principal of the Central school has come to know most of the young fellows of the city, thinks he could identify them.

The owners of the car were not much concerned over the incident. They recognized that it would be impossible for any one to drive it very far from the city, on account of the conditions of the roads.

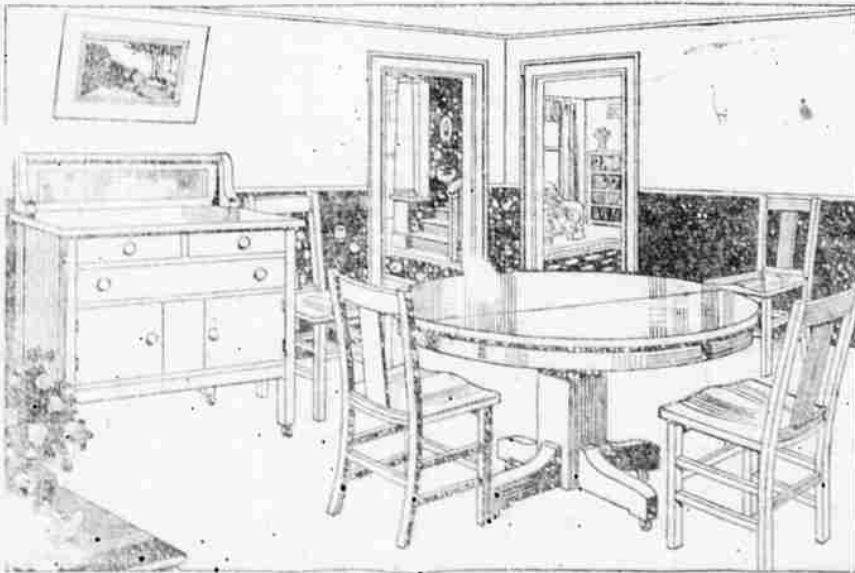
