## CITY MANAGER MAKES REPORT

I have to report for the week ending March 15:  
One fire at the corner of Adams avenue and Maple street, in the Toy Young property. This fire occurred on the night of March 12th and is supposed to have been caused by a fire started at the rear of the building. Considerable damage was done but the exact amount has not been ascertained as yet.

The department was called out a second time to the same place owing to smoldering fire under the shingles having broken out anew. It was necessary to lay 1150 feet of hose to reach the fire and fifteen volunteers responded to the call.

Three arrests were made by the police department for the week and \$115 in fines collected. The arrests were for drunkenness, having liquor in possession and violating the traffic ordinances.

One license for pool hall was issued by the recorder and warrants drawn on the general fund for \$1,887.71 in payment of bills for the month of February. Two building permits were also granted. The treasurer's office shows receipts and disbursements as follows:

## FUNERAL UNDER MASONIC RITES

RELATIVES TAKE REMAINS OF ED: RUMBLE TO JOSEPH

Prominent Citizen and Business Man of Portland Will Be Laid to Rest at Old Home.

With a profusion of beautiful floral offerings surrounding the coffin, the remains of the late Ed Rumble lay in the baggage car of the branch train this morning, on their way to Mr. Rumble's old home at Joseph for interment. The relatives who accompanied the remains from Portland were the widow and her father, H. B. Storer, who is also a resident of Portland. While in La Grande, Mrs. Rumble and Mr. Storer were entertained at the home of Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Lilly, who went with them to Joseph this morning to attend the funeral.

The remains of the late Mr. Rumble will be interred at Joseph tomorrow morning. The funeral service, which will be held at 10 o'clock, will be according to the rites of the Masonic order, of which the deceased and his father had long been loyal members. The father and mother are still living and reside at Joseph.

Deceased was a member also of the Elks lodge of La Grande, and C. R. Eberhard, grand exalted ruler of the order here and other officials were at the train this morning to pay their respects to the memory of their late brother. F. S. Ivannhoe of this city, who will deliver a eulogy to the late Mr. Rumble at the service tomorrow, went out to Joseph this morning.
