## DEVELOPING A NEW INDUSTRY

WALLOWA MARBLE-GRANITE COMPANY ORGANIZED

Machinery to Be Installed for Finishing Stone for Monumental and Building Purposes

JOSEPH, March 19.—(Special)—J. M. Newell is in town this week in the interests of a new company which is being formed and which will be known as the Wallowa Marble-Granite Company. The company's capital is \$25,000 and the officers are E. E. Amaden of Portland, president and manager; J. M. Newell of La Grande, vice president and superintendent of construction; D. L. Kilgore of Colorado, secretary.

This company will develop a large deposit of granite in this county, and will install machinery for finishing monumental and building stone. The marble, which will also be obtained within the boundaries of Wallowa county is said to be equal to Vermont marble.

HITCHCOCK'S PRESENCE

AT COBLENZ FUZZLING  
COBLENZ, March 21.—General Pershing completed his official visit to the troops in the occupied area of Germany Thursday, devoting the forenoon to an inspection and review of the 4th corps at Cochem-on-Moselle and the afternoon to a review of the 4th division near the same town.

Among the spectators was Frank H. Hitchcock, former postmaster general, who stated that he was in the occupied area merely on a sight-seeing trip.

GREEKS WERE OUTNUMBERED BUT GAINED KHERSON VICTORY

SALONIKI, March 21.—The Greek victory at Kheron, northwest of Odessa, was won over a Bolshevik force of four times the strength of the Greek division engaged, according to an official statement issued at Greek army headquarters here. The statement declares the Bolshevik armies have been reorganized and are under the command of German officers, a large number of whom participated in the battle.

"The Greek troops realized an advance to the depth of a little more than twelve miles, capturing numerous prisoners and considerable booty. In spite of reinforcements, the Bolshevik troops have not been able to reconstitute their line," the statement adds.

PAYS \$50,000 FOR BULL

"Richard Fairfax," a 5-year-old Hereford, brings Record Price

CHICAGO, March 21.—What was declared to be a world record price of \$50,000 for a pure-bred Hereford bull, was announced Thursday by J. B. Ferguson, brother of Cobby, Minn., for "Richard Fairfax," a 5-year-old registered animal. The best previous American price was \$31,000 for "Ardmore," sold by W. L. Yost to W. B. Pickering, both of Kansas City, Mo.

"Richard Fairfax" was raised by Warren T. McGraw of Kentland, Ind. He was 5 years old last November and it is believed he is the best Hereford bull in the world. His weight is between 2400 and 2500 pounds.

## MRS. ALICE KNIGHT DIED OF PNEUMONIA

Well Known Church Woman of Eastern Oregon Died in the Service Across the Seas.

Upton P. Gibbs, former pastor of St. Peter's Episcopal church of La Grande, sends the following unswerving note pertaining to the death in France of a church worker, Miss Alice Knight, who is well known in La Grande:

"A telegram has been received announcing the death from pneumonia of Alice J. Knight who was decorated under Bishop Paddock's banner in France for some years. After leaving Oregon she volunteered for war work and was accepted by the Y. M. C. A. to work in the canteens in France. After the armistice was signed she was transferred to the educational department and delivered lectures at various camps, on "Joan of Arc," "Brittany," etc. No further particulars beyond the mention of her death and its immediate cause was sent."
