RELIEF WORK IS NATION WIDE

HALF OF TIME FOR CONTRIBUTING IS GONE
Local Delivery Bins Will Pick Up Bundles on Return Trips for The Red Cross.

With millions of men, women and children refugees in Allied countries in sorest need of clothing of any kind the American Red Cross has set the week of March 24-29th for a nation-wide collection of used clothing, shoes and blankets for these helpless people. Every report and survey from abroad shows unmistakably that the clothing problem faced by those returning to their devastated homes is one of the most serious they have to face and it is equally clear that it is to America that the sufferers must turn.

The reason the refugees must look to the outside world for succor is that even though they had raw materials they would still be helpless because of the vandalism committed upon their textile industries by the Germans. The first step toward helping them has been taken by the War Council of the American Red Cross arranging for an emergency shipment of 1,500,000 yards of textile. But still there is a great deal yet to be done.

The ladies of the local Red Cross are confident that the people of La Grande will make a fine response to the appeal of the stricken folks of Europe for relief. With three days of their relief work already gone, they have met with a very generous response, but they emphasize the fact that there is great need for all the clothing they can possibly get and urge the citizens of this city to send in just as much as they can spare, and then a little more.

To facilitate the work of collecting the clothing given, arrangements have been made to have parcels received at any of the following places: Jock's Grocery Store, Lee Grocery Store, Old Town Grocery Store, Harris Grocery Store, Sennett Grocery Store. Also the La Grande Delivery Company will bring in parcels on their return trips, and the Modera and Standard deliveries will also gather up bundles. All such bundles should be marked for the Red Cross, so as not to become confused and lost.

HAS HOPE FOR RUSSIA
Young Diplomat at Omsk Looks for Stable Government.

OMSK, Siberia, Feb. 4.—(By mail)—Russia's best diplomat in its agony, in the opinion of G. K. Gins, Vice-Minister for foreign affairs of the All-Russian government discussing the political situation with the correspondent of the Associated Press. Mr. Gins is one of the group of young men who have thrown in their lot with the new ministry and who are determined that this experiment of founding a successful government shall prove a success.

Mr. Gins was formerly a professor of international law in the University of Petrograd. With his wife and two children he was one of that numerous band of Russians who were obliged to flee easterly to escape the scourge of Bolshevism and terrorism.

The young diplomat thought that the powers would see in Russia's regenerated army, as shown by the taking of Perm, the symptoms of the rebirth of the state and evidence that the state is fully able to protect itself. There was no doubt in his mind about the friendly disposition of the Allies.

Mr. Gins said: "Foreign powers are looking for a steady government supported by the public opinion of the whole nation and now, I believe, they have found it. We are on the way to civic peace."

NO REAL STANDARD

Strength of a German Division Has No Numerical Basis.

BERLIN, March 25.—There is no longer any set standard for the strength of a division in the German army, say American experts. This is regarded as important in view of the fact that delegates at the peace conference not long ago suggested that the German army be limited to six divisions.

At the beginning of the war a German division comprised about 16,000 men. In the latter part of the war the divisions consisted of three infantry and one artillery regiment, with pioneers, signalmen and various other technical troops amounting approximately 2,000 men. At present, it is declared, no division in the German army has 5,000 men and there are probably divisions with less than one thousand men.

In demobilization it has obviously been the policy to make the regiment the prime unit but to retain in existence all divisional staffs of divisions which existed in July, 1914.

It is probable, according to the experts with the American army of Occupation, that there still exist in the German army one hundred or more divisional staffs in more or less skeleton form. These divisions are "demobilized" but not dissolved. Apparently it has been the purpose to retain a considerable number of staffs in skeleton form until the future of the German army is definitely decided by the National Assembly in Weimar.

Taking these facts into consideration, the American officers who have made a careful study of the demobilization of the German army as well as all other activities of the enemy troops that term division in connection with the present German army has no standard meaning. In connection with the future army of Germany the Americans assert that the term division requires a defining clause such as a "division on pre-war establishment," or a "division November 11, 1918."

MRS. EMILY BOISE DIED AT SALEM

SALEM, March 26.—Mrs. Emily Boise, aged 91, died today. Mrs. Boise was the widow of the late Judge R. P. Boise, a well known Oregon jurist and one of the framers of the Oregon constitution.

HIS "RELIGION" GOT HIM TEN DAYS IN JAIL

"Doc" Ellwell, who was found by the police last night in an intoxicated condition, was brought before Police Judge Eakin this morning to answer a charge of drunkenness. He pleaded guilty, but would not say where he obtained the refreshments that were responsible for his inebriation. He said his religion prevented him imparting the desired information. The judge told him that if that was his brand of religion he might have a few days to meditate upon the error of his ways. He therefore fined him \$25 and ordered him to spend ten days in jail.

GRAND JURY IN SESSION

The members of the grand jury for the circuit court, who were called by Judge Knowles last week, are in session again today for the investigation of a number of cases. It is expected that their report may possibly be returned tomorrow and about the end of the month the petit jury will convene for a special session of court to act on the true bills returned.
