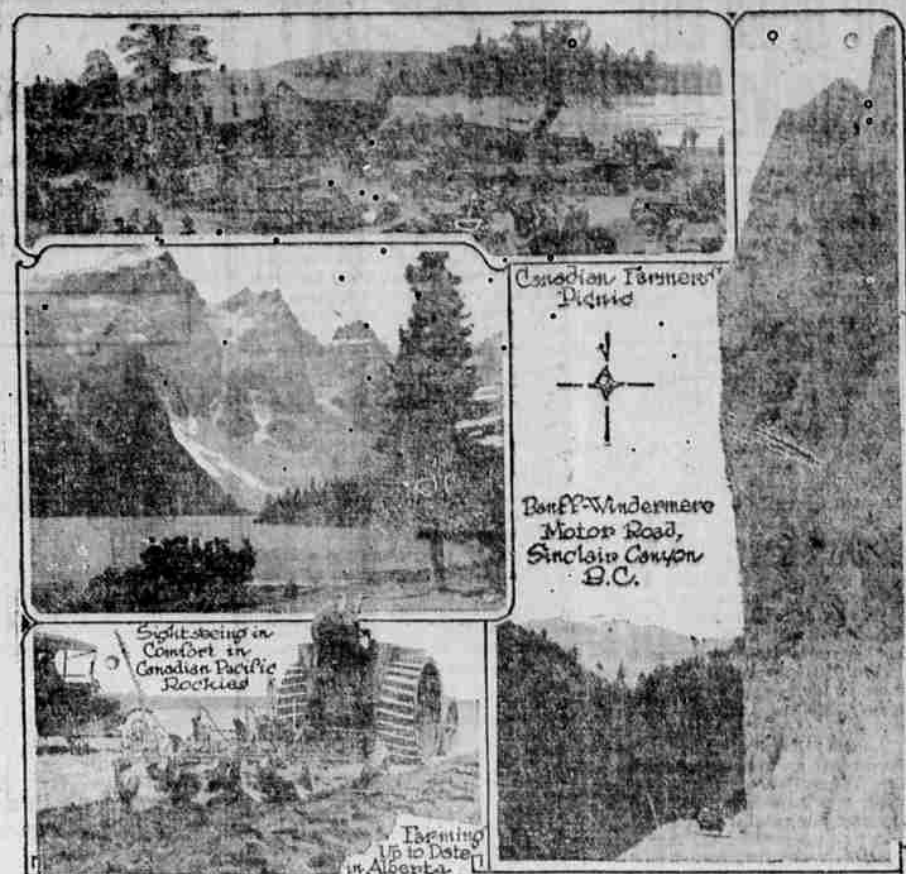

CANADA'S APPETITE FOR AUTOMOBILES SPEEDS MOTOR INDUSTRY



Revolutions are the order of the day. Not all of them are bloody, neither are governments the only things that are being revolutionized. This age is seeing innovations in education, industry, transportation and general living conditions in greater measure than any other century has recorded. To a great extent the automobile is responsible for these changes and nowhere is its power more in evidence than in Canada.

Prairie schooners and ox-teams that marked the trail of western pioneers in the seventies and eighties are almost curiosities today. Go into any of the western provinces and what will you find in their stead? Tractors for plowing and reaping, motor trucks for hauling grain to market, and automobiles for carrying the farmer's family to town, to church or to some social affair that may be taking place in the neighborhood—a neighborhood with a radius of thirty or more miles. Not so picturesque as the old styles perhaps, but much more comfortable and profitable. The demand for motor cars in western centres is always greater than the supply.

The bus wagon is invading the hitherto special province of the mountain pony and the sure-footed burro. Pony trails are giving way to excellent roads, even in the fastnesses of the Canadian Pacific Rockies, and today the trip between Lake Louise and Yoho Valley can be made in a motor car, the Canadian Pacific Railway having instituted automobile service between these popular resorts.

Canada has its transcontinental railways. There is talk of an aerial highway that shall follow the Canadian Pacific route. Is it not possible that in time it will also have a coast-to-coast motor way? From Vancouver many miles of good roads stretch eastward through British Columbia. The mileage of motor roads in Quebec and Ontario grows yearly. In between these are many stretches of excellent motor ways, such as the famous Banff-Windermere highway, and those radiating from Calgary, Regina, Winnipeg and Fort William that may, some day, be linked into a great chain.

Automobile manufacturers have not been blind to the opportunity that is theirs in Canada and a number have opened branches there. In spite of the fact that many plants were given over to munition making, there were in Canada at the close of 1917 eleven automobile factories and twenty-four plants for the manufacture of automobile accessories. These represented a capital investment of over thirty-one millions of dollars and turned out more than sixty million dollars worth of products. Already this industry is feeling the impetus of peace and planning expansions that shall employ many of the returning heroes.

TITHERS WILL GIVE BIG SUM

METHODIST CHURCH TO GET A BILLION AND A HALF

Centenary Movement Blazing the Way for World Conquest by Christian Forces.

To raise an estimated \$300,000,000 a year for five years, a total of \$1,500,000,000—to raise it not in great gifts or large subscriptions from the wealthy, but mainly from individuals in tithes, after the manner of the Biblical tenth, and to disburse this immense fund over the globe so as to make the church in fact, as it is in theory, the moral and spiritual agency upon which Christian civilization rests, and in the doing of it to revive the membership

of Protestant churches on this continent and galvanize it into a living, vital force in world affairs—such is the program of the biggest church movement in the two thousand years since Christ walked in Galilee.

But for the war, which taught us to think big and pull together, this change from the static to the dynamic wouldn't have been possible, though there are 25,000,000 communicants of Protestant churches in North America and 20,000,000 Sunday school pupils in the 200,000 churches.

The inter-church world movement of North America, they call it. Thirty different denominations are in it. Cyrus H. McCormick of Chicago is its leader as chairman of the committee of one hundred, and Dr. S. Earl Taylor, executive secretary of the centenary committee of the Methodist church, is chief executive officer with the title of general secretary.

The Methodists started it. They set out to raise \$35,000,000, \$5,000,000 at once for war reconstruction work and the other \$30,000,000 in five years. Then the Methodist church South joined in with a \$35,000,000 program, making \$120,000,000 of Methodist money altogether. This is already partly subscribed and likely to be so largely oversubscribed as to reach a total of \$200,000,000.

One hardly thinks of the Methodists as a rich church, but the Methodist constituency in this country alone has an estimated wealth of \$25,000,000,000 and it is increasing at the rate of a billion dollars a year. The regular benevolences of the church—and this doesn't include the Methodist church South, which is a separate affair located in the southern states—increased by \$600,000 last year without any special effort in their behalf.

The Methodists spent two years in making a world survey upon which to base their campaign. Soon the Presbyterian began to be interested and before the world survey was completed, interest was general among the rest of the Protestant denominations. They just had to get into the movement or be left behind.

Think of the power of a billion and a half dollars! And think of the revitalizing influence of such a campaign on the church members! A quarter of the population of the United States they are. Even the Catholics are taking notice. The fact is we are nearer church unity and denominational fusion in this country than we ever were before.

And the point in it all is that the Christian church is civilization's real defense against the social unrest, which has its latest focus in Bolshevism; or else it is a mere affair of form and mummery and somewhat of intellectual stimulation, thrust one side by the march of events. Peace conferences may legislate against the Bolshevik and treat with their representatives, and the theoretical idealist may feed them and thus encourage them in the course as wrong-headed as his, but in the final analysis it is personal work with the individual which will stop the spread of Bolshevism.
