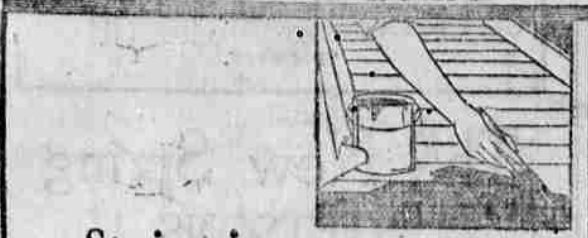

OFFICERS HERE FOR RECRUITS

ENLISTMENTS AGAIN OPEN IN ALL BRANCHES OF ARMY

One Year and Three Year Periods of Service, Depending Upon Previous Training.

Sgt. E. L. French and Cpl. M. S. Washbuck, of the special recruiting service, Portland, are in La Grande recruiting duty today and tomorrow. Their headquarters are at the Savoy hotel, in the federal building. From here Cpl. Washbuck goes to Baker to establish a recruiting office there, and Sgt. French will go to Enterprise, and then back to Portland Saturday night.

Men between the ages of eighteen and 35 are wanted for all branches of the army. Men enlisting for their first time will enlist for three years, while those who have had military training can enlist for one year. All men enlisted in this part of the country are sent to the San Francisco Recruiting Depot. Recruits entering for three years may apply for discharge at the end of two years.

There will be no reserve service attached to either the one or the three year enlistments. It will be the policy of the war department to send overseas those who enlist for three years. Pay and allowances are the same now as were paid during the recent war. General recruiting is now being renewed, after being discontinued last September, and as short terms of enlistment are offered, a large number of men are expected to be recruited.

ADVOCATES OF VIOLENCE CHEERED BY RADICALS

Bolshevist Ideas Given Approval and Scott Nearing's Appeals Win Ovation.

NEW YORK, March 24.—A suggestion that members of the National Security League and the United States "student" service agents be ducked in the East river was cheered by nearly 5000 radicals who attended a meeting here Saturday to protest against imprisonment of Eugene V. Debs, Socialist leader, and other radicals convicted of violating the espionage act.

The suggestion was made by Joseph Caldwell of Providence, R. I., who explained that Russian revolutionists had ducked all military police. Caldwell exhibited a diagram with which he said government agents had obtained evidence to convict him of violating the espionage law. He explained his presence at the meeting by saying he was out on \$25,000 bail, pending an appeal.

Another salvo of cheers greeted Caldwell's amendment that Debs had declared he wanted "first, last and all the time" to be known as a Bolshevist.

Scott Nearing, Socialist and former college professor, acquitted recently of violating the espionage act, was given an ovation when he urged that all American workers unite in organization of an "industrial commonwealth."

"This," he declared, "is the only means you have of obtaining real freedom. You must be ready to sacrifice your lives to this cause if need be."

Irwin St. John Tucker proposed a nationwide strike on July 4 in protest against the imprisonment of Debs and other radicals.

The meeting was held under the auspices of the city committee of the Socialist party. A squad of police attended the meeting but arrested only one man, who was held on a charge of littering the street with paper.

St. Helena according to a column report, appears to have no real criminals. Stone-throwing by night was a short period the most serious offense. Last year no person was committed for trial; 104 out of 210 summary cases came under the education road tax, and poor law ordinances and 77 trivial cases were dealt with by the police without bringing them to court. Three instances of flogging are recorded, under the juvenile smoking ordinance.



AT SHERRY'S

The most celebrated original action of modern times is without question "The Callaux Case" of France. This is only one of the many thrilling climaxes that Adrian Johnson has included in the scenario of this absorbing drama.

It is only through the trial and condemnation to death of Bolo Pasha for his pro-German activities in France that the Callauxs are finally bailed in their unscrupulous careers. Evidence found by the United States government in the papers of Count Von Bernstorff, the dismissed German ambassador, involves Callaux with Bolo in treasonable acts, sends to a prison cell this man who was once Premier of the French Republic, and drives him to disgrace the ambitious woman who inspired his schemes.

These are only the bare outlines of this stirring international drama. It is all history and its details are accurate. So great are the emotional requirements of the various famous scenes, that Richard Stanton, the director of "The Callaux Case," has given the picture an all-star cast, including Madeline Traverso, Henry Warwick, Eugene Ormande, Phillip Van Loan, Emile La Croix and other eminent screen players. Stage sets in the play are duplication of scenes in the original story. Also a comedy.

MARY PICKFORD'S NEW PICTURE IS DELIGHTFUL

For genuinely delicious humor and timely interest, announcement is made that Mary Pickford's newest photoplay, "Johanna Enlists," a screen adaptation of Rupert Hughes' successful story, "The Mobilization of Johanna," which will be shown at the Star theatre Saturday and Sunday, is perhaps the most pleasing offering of the season and in many respects one of the most novel and delightful vehicles ever provided for this famous cinema star.

One feature of unusual interest which makes this photoplay most notable is that the military scenes with which it abounds presents the members of the 143rd Regiment, Field Artillery, of which Miss Pickford is the honorary colonel. The troops were encamped at Universal Ranch, in California, where the scenes were "shot," and they will, of course, be absolutely realistic, even to a court-martial which is carried out with every attention to detail.

Miss Pickford has a charming role in this picture. It is said to be quite different from any she has essayed heretofore. She is a freckled country girl with a highly romantic turn of mind, and when she decides to take a milk bath to improve her beauty, interesting developments ensue. A jealous soldier and his rival, an officer, provide the situation which ends in an insult, a court-martial, and the appearance of the hero on the scene. Of course, the final is happy for all concerned. Miss Pickford is splendidly supported by a cast of picked players, her leading man being Douglas McLean.

"TARZAN OF THE APES"

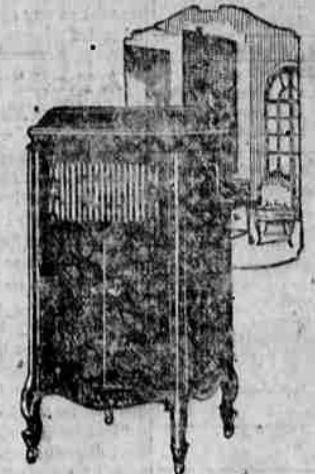
"Tarzan of the Apes," which excited considerable interest among the readers of popular-fiction fiction will be shown at the Arcade theatre Saturday and Sunday in film form. Being the story of a princeling man—or, rather, of a man brought up among apes and endowed with many of their abilities—it presents not a few difficulties to the movie maker. All of these have been overcome in the film at the Broadway, and are being realistically from bough to bough in the jungle the white lions and leopards seek their prey on the ground below.

Intertwined with the jungle story is a domestic narrative which grows tedious at times, and the expedient of the cut-back is resorted to a trifle too freely. All of this is more than compensated for, however, by the stirring scenes of the jungle. A majority of these were photographed in Brazil, and several hundred natives appear before the camera. The picture, as a whole, in addition to being interesting, also has a touch of educational value. An actor named Kimo Lincoln meets his difficult surroundings in the hero satisfactorily.

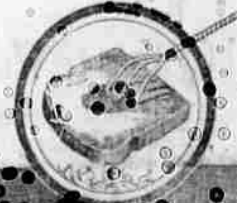
