## SUMMER RATES FOR TOURISTS

Tickets Will Be Sold in East for Coast Points at One and a Third Fare.

Definite plans have been made for an adequate publicity campaign to tell of the attractions of the Pacific northwest by the United States railroad administration, according to a letter received by Sydney B. Vincent, publicity manager of the Portland chamber of commerce, from the office of Director General Walker D. Hines.

In addition the letter mentions that it has also decided to authorize the sale of summer tourist tickets at a material reduction from the one-way fares. The rate from Chicago, the Missouri river and the Twin Cities to the principal resorts on the Pacific coast will be on the basis of one and one-third fare for the round trip.

The letter from the bureau of operations says that the publicity campaign will include newspaper advertising and the publication of a booklet, the letter says, is now in preparation.

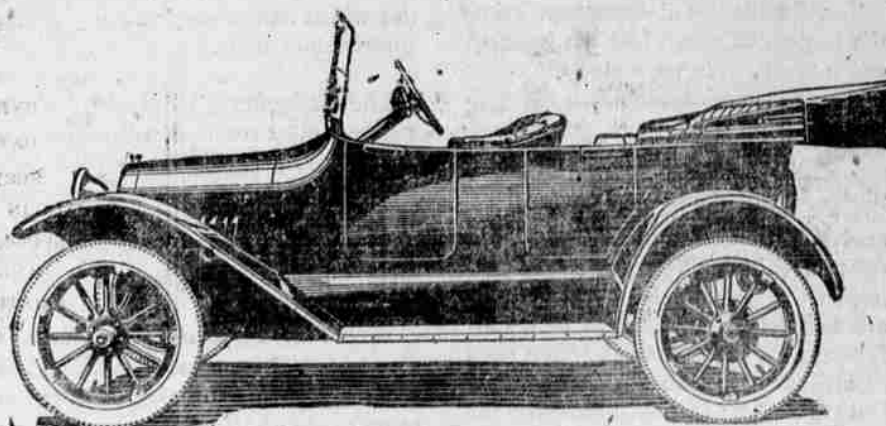
