PORTO RICO WOMEN WANT SUFFRAGE

Women's League of 2500 Members is Working on Plan of Campaign

SAN JUAN, PORTO RICO, March 13. (By Mail)—That women in Porto Rico should have all rights granted to men under the existing laws, is the proposal of an act introduced into the house of representatives by Representative Gonzalez Meno.

The Women's League of Porto Rico, with over 2,500 members throughout the island, and which is working to obtain the vote for women, is not in favor of the bill as it is considered too sweeping in its terms. The league feels that if the vote is given to ignorant and illiterate women throughout the island it will mean only more votes to be controlled by the politicians.

It wants votes only for women who can read and write, more for educational and patriotic reasons than for political purposes and the women expect to use their influence and power in social, charitable, moral and intellectual ways.

Under the control of the Women's League of Porto Rico the women's suffrage movement in the island has made a considerable advance considering that it has been in progress only two years. For many years Porto Rico has held the usual Latin American idea of woman's place in life.

Bills providing for woman's suffrage were introduced last year in the legislature but failed to pass, while not very ardent hopes are entertained of the bill recently introduced, which in any case is thought by the league to be too far reaching. Members of the league, however, are not discouraged and will continue their work until the women of Porto Rico who can read and write are given the vote to be used for the moral and social benefit of the island.

AN OLD GRAVE FOUND

GLENROCK, Wyo., March 28.—A fifty-eight year search for the grave of A. H. Unthank, who was a member of a party of California gold miners, ended last evening when Mr. Arthur J. A. Unthank of Wallhill, Neb., visited the grave, marked by a headstone on which the inscription, "A. H. Unthank, died July 2, 1850" had almost been obliterated by the elements.

A. H. Unthank left his home in the east late in the year 1849 to go to California, which was crowded with gold seekers. As the caravan neared what is now Glenrock, he sickened and died. The other members of the party buried him and erected the headstone which now marks his grave, reaching California some of the party notified his relatives of his death but was unable to give them the exact location of the grave.

J. A. Unthank, a nephew, a young man at the time of his uncle's death, has ever since endeavored to locate the grave of his relative without success until his recent visit here. He will fence the plot and erect a monument in memory of his uncle.

CALIFORNIA NOT INDUSTRY

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., March 28.—Thirty thousand pounds of walnut meats were shipped recently by the Santa Barbara Walnut Growers' Association in one consignment to a Milwaukee candy concern to be made up into confections. This shipment, the officials of the association say, shows up the surplus held in storage for the season. The consignment was valued at \$15,000.

Not picked and cracked by the processors during the season just over brought about 70,000 pounds of meats, valued at \$40,000.

BIG DAM CONTRACT

SALT LAKE CITY, March 28.—Bids are being received by the Utah board of land commissioners on contracts for 85,000 feet of earthen fill for the Pinte dam, which stores water which irrigates a large portion of Platte county in the southeastern part of the state. It is planned to strengthen the structure to enable it to store water up to the 85-foot water level instead of the 65-foot mark, as at present.

Previous bids for the work were thrown out recently because of allegations of collusion between prospective bidders; it was announced recently by Arthur Kuhn, secretary of the board.

Everything is competitive in the marine corps and all commissioned officers are chosen from the ranks.

C., to the effect that a large number of motor mechanics are required for aviation duty, and any that may be so-called will be transferred to Marine Flying Field, Miami, Fla. These persons of the advantages offered by the marine corps service and the others will gladly be explained to you by the sergeant at the local marine corps recruiting station, from No. 11, Sanmer building.
