THE CALLAUX CASE FOR THE LAST TIME TONIGHT That "The Callaux Case" is aptly called "the sensation of two continents" is the general verdict of the big audiences which saw this splendid William Fox photoplay at the Sherry theatre yesterday. The picture will be shown for the last time today.

The fight between the ape and gorilla which occurs in the second period of the play is another exciting event. "Prince Charles," a trained chimpanzee, and "Lord Kenneth," a fine specimen of gorilla, were set upon each other.

The elephant scene when Tarzan rides at the head of the herd and raids the cannibal village was with Barum & Bailey's circus, and was purchased by the National Film Corporation.
