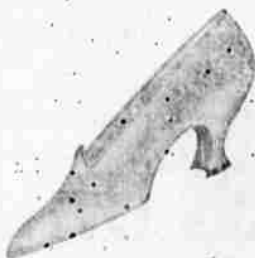

SPRING FEVER POSSESSES THE
YOUNG WANDERERS

Boys Ride Freight Engine in from
Baker, on Way to Join Dads
in Portland.

Chief of Police Christianson's premises in the city building somewhat resemble a kindergarten court today. The chief has three stray infants, two human and one canine, under his care. The two youngsters, who are twelve or thirteen years of age, are being entertained by the city as the result of a desire for travel which they were unable to overcome. They arrived in town during the night, riding the tender of a freight engine. They had buried themselves under the coal to keep warm, and were discovered by the fireman when he almost jammed his shovel into the head of one of them.

The homes of the two boys, whose names are Jack Blaiseley and Frederick Hunter, are at Durkee. The fathers of both boys are working in Portland and it was to join them that the youngsters embarked upon the trip west. They left home three days ago, with a joint expense fund of \$1.40. To earn this the boys had carried in wood and raked lawns for their neighbors for several days, but all that remained to them this morning when they got off here was ten cents. They had stopped over in Baker for a day, and for food there they had spent nearly all the money they had.

They were rather grimy looking youngsters as they sat eating a free breakfast in the police office this morning, but they either were not hungry enough to clean up their plates, or else were beginning to feel touches of homesickness. They both were bright faced, however, and undaunted by the interruption of their journey. Self reliance shone from the clear, blue eyes of Fred, and Jack's warm brown ones, a first rate combination for two pals to have when going up against the world. Jack does not want to go back to Durkee, where his step-mother lives, and Fred joins him in sticking to their purpose to get to their dads at Portland. Chief Christianson expects to have them with him for a couple of days yet, until he can get word from their parents.

The other guest at the jail is a very young and very hungry pup, which is regaining his strength under the chief's care and waiting for someone to claim him.

"Yes, it is a fact. Arrangements have already been made with our local agents, Messrs. Fish & Bowen, to handle the stock. The first carload of kerosene engines and centrifugal pumps has arrived."

"It is the custom of my firm to follow up the past performance of a locality and ascertain the volume of business contributed; if it figures in volume as in this case, they immediately get busy, and place a stock as they are now doing in your city. And by taking all things into consideration with the natural resources of Eastern Oregon, which include mining, lumbering, stock raising and farming, the future conditions assure us a much greater volume of business."
