Alaska Soldier Tells of Flu

A soldier passing through La Grande yesterday on his way home from Alaska and Camp Lewis, told at the Red Cross canteen, where he had lunch, of the flu conditions among the men at the camp. There were seventy-six men who came down from Alaska, he said. Seventy of them went to the hospital with influenza and in one week sever of that number died.
