Ray D. Lillibridge of New York Governs Every Move by Inexorable System.

TAB ON EVERYTHING

Card Index Up-to-Date on His Clothes and Cars, His Recreation and His Eating, Even to His Friends.

New York.—Hail Ray D. Lillibridge of New York, who is the most systematic man in the world. At least, he lays claim to that distinction.

Mr. Lillibridge lives by card index. His entire daily life, his social, family, professional and recreative life is all neatly if somewhat exhaustively dictated by an inexorable system.

In his pocket he carries always with him a compact series of "reminder" cards. They ordain his life. There is a list of his friends with their phone numbers.

In his bedroom at home, Lillibridge keeps a chart showing just how many suits of clothes he has; how many shirts, socks, collars, neckties, handkerchiefs, underwear, shoes, hats, canes, umbrellas, etc. The tailor and the laundryman can put nothing over on him.

Keeps Tab on Motors. By a similar "simple" system this genius keeps tabs on his motor cars. Each night his chauffeur mails to his office a little card with the speedometer readings at the beginning and end of the day to show the mileage; a brief summary of the places where he has driven the car, what he spent for gasoline, etc. All this is entered in a
