State News

The Wallowa Heating & Plumbing company has a crew of men busy digging trenches and connecting up with the new sewer many homes in the city.

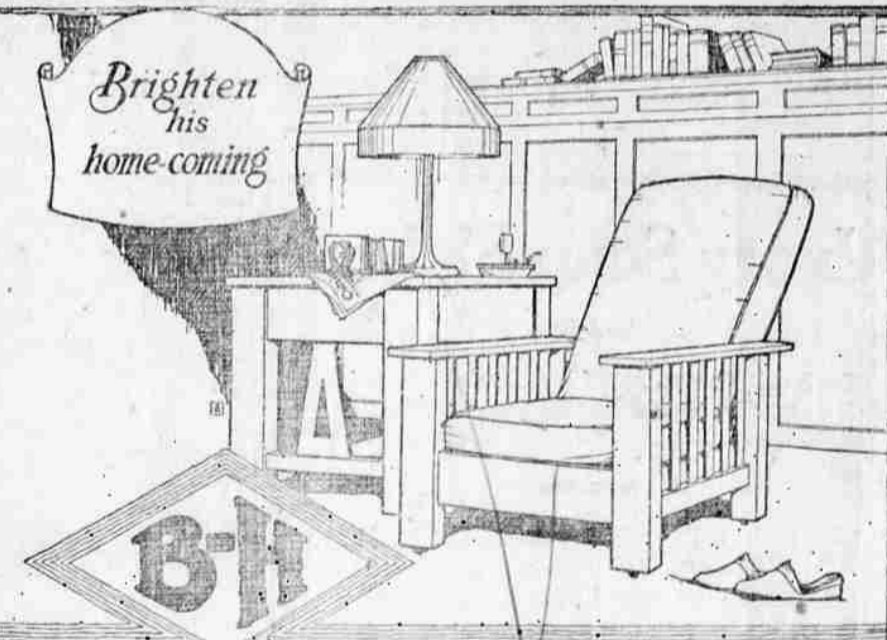
