### WAR WASTE JUSTIFIED BY VICTORY

(Continued from Page 1)

France and helped America's soldiers battle the Hun, it was worth the price. Last fall every father and mother would have given their last dollar to see the war finished, and now, he said, neither they nor any of the rest of us should be any less willing to pay.

Mr. Zurcher spoke on somewhat similar lines. He said that the duty of a patriot is to whatever his country asks of him, whether it be to die or to pay. It is not necessary now that we die, but it is vital that we all pay, he said. If the war had continued until this spring America would have paid with lives of 250,000 of her best men, besides an enormous sum of money. Surely, he said, that great saving is worth at least six billion dollars to America this spring. Mr. Zurcher is interested in Union county, he claimed, having been a former resident, and he was confident that the response to the coming appeal would be as unmistakably hearty as ever.

Dan P. Smythe, Pendleton sheep man, was present and at the invitation of the chairman to take the floor for a few minutes, laid down a verbal barrage around both the Victory loan and the good roads proposition that made them both impervious to attack.

The importance of the Victory loan campaign resulted in most of the luncheon hour being taken for its discussion, and consequently there was little progress made with the organization of the proposed Ad club. The only business in this connection was the submitting of data that had been secured with regard to affiliation with the veterans and the national associations. A copy of the bylaws of the Portland Ad club had been received with the data, but as these were not considered suitable for local conditions they were not discussed. A committee was appointed to take up the matter of preparing new by-laws.

Good roads discussion is becoming a habit with G. L. Larson, and he had another "gag" on the topic to day. The state highway commission or will be here tomorrow evening, he announced, to furnish estimates on the cost of the proposed new roads in this county, and following that it is the intention of the good roads committee to hold meetings at various towns around the county in the interests of the Tax Limitations and the Market Roads bills. His request for volunteers to accompany the committee to the various towns on the evenings these meetings are held met with a good response. Passage of the two bills mentioned, Mr. Larson holds, is essential to the success of the good roads movement in Union county.

Another proposal made was that the business men of La Grande lend their hearty support to the live stock sale which is to be held here about the third week in April and try to have semi-annual live stock sales permanently established in La Grande. The proposal met the unanimous approval of the meeting and P. H. Spillman, county agriculturist, was appointed chairman of a committee to represent the organization in this work.

The report of the committee appointed last week to arrange for future noon luncheons was presented by Jas. Snodgrass, chairman of the committee, who announced that on the next two Tuesdays the luncheons will be held in the Y. M. C. A. and he stated that it was a possibility that they might be permanently held there.

Wm. Miller was appointed chairman of the luncheon for next week. The attendance at the weekly luncheons is keeping up in good shape and is taken to promise well for the success of the new Ad club when that organization is finally launched.
