State News
Articles of incorporation of the Fall River Mill company were filed at Eugene Saturday. They will operate a sawmill near Fall Creek.

St. Helens is experiencing a building activity which entails the expenditure of close to \$100,000. A new municipal dock and a \$40,000 school house are among the projects.

To remove varnish stains, first scrub the spots with alcohol two or three times, then rub with a clean cloth. If the color is injured, sponge afterward with chloroform to restore it, unless the color is blue, in which case vinegar should be used instead.

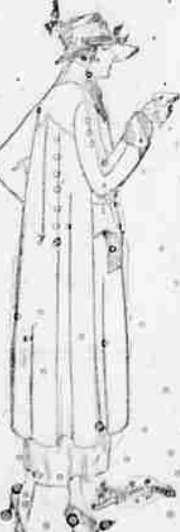
