WYOMING BANKERS MEET

CHEYENNE, Wyo., April 2.—Bankers from all over the state gathered here today to discuss plans for raising Wyoming's quota of the Victory loan which will approximate seven million dollars, and the business outlook during the period of readjustment.

The call for the meeting was issued by W. D. Johnston, president of the Wyoming Bankers' association. Mr. Johnston told the bankers, at the opening of the conference, that the new loan will be the hardest one of all to raise because the war has been won. He expressed the belief Wyoming would exceed her quota as in the past, but it meant hard work and concentration of ideas on the part of the bankers to do it.

Mr. Johnston also warned the bankers that there probably would be a reduction of wage, in the near future, "and a man for every job and some without a job" and he called upon the delegates to work together for some plan to solve the industrial problems of the reconstruction period.

La Grande Young Man Completes Nearly Two Years of Service

Ted Stilwell, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Stilwell, of Postville, is finally at home again after a long period in the service. The young man was one of the very first to enlist from this locality, the date of his entrance being May 22, 1917. He was first sent to Angel Island, California, was later transferred to Honolulu. He was then sent back to the states and has been at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. His case is very typical of the uncertainties of military service. While getting in on the very start, he never at any time had much show to get into action in France. He originally joined the cavalry and on account of his experience in horsemanship he was detailed as an instructor for several months and was detained in the home camp. He later joined the artillery but did not happen to connect with any organization that was assigned for overseas duty. And thus it was that an enthusiastic young soldier who early did his best to get a chance at the Hun was detained for nearly two years around home camps with the exception of the time he was assigned to duty in the Hawaiian district. He held the rank of corporal at the time of his discharge.
