CITY MANAGER MAKES REPORT

The principal work for the past week, outside of the regular routine, has been on the streets, dragging and crowding up same. Practically all the principal streets have been dragged and the grader is now being used to crown them up.

In addition to this the streetsuperintendent and himself have been inspecting the side and cross walks and having same repaired. Gravel is being hauled from N avenue for filling in at cross walks, the object being also to get this street down to grade. The graveling of streets has been held up, on account of high water covering the gravel beds.

The cleaning of the septic tank has been completed and surplus water in various parts of the city is being taken care of. In the fire department the only activity for the week was a call from box 43 for a grass fire. The fire was under control when the department arrived at the scene and no particular damage was done. Thirteen volunteers responded to the call. The police report fourteen arrests for the week: One for drunkenness, one for having liquor in possession, one for disorderly conduct, two for vagrancy, five for traffic violation, one for smoking cigarettes, one insane. Fines collected were \$245.

Licenses issued as reported by the recorder were, one day, two rooming houses and three building permits.

The treasurer reports receipts \$553.95 and disbursements \$255.64. The city engineer has established a number of grade lines for sidewalks the past week and with the street superintendent, city attorney and myself looked into the matter of the property line on the south side of blocks 147 to 151 in Chaplin's addition upon which the attorney will report. We also inspected the work being done on the streets and the proposed improvement on Walnut street. Respectfully submitted, JOHN COLLIER, Manager.

MORMON TEAM VICTORS AGAIN

M. I. A. BASKETBALLERS REMAIN UNDEFEATED

Fast Games Played at Y. M. C. A. Last Night—Presbyterians Defeat Baptists

By a single basket, the M. I. A. basketball team defeated the Methodists last night at the Y. M. C. A., 15 to 13. The game was a tie at the end of the playing period and a five minutes additional was played in which the M. I. A. team came out the winner. Although there are several games yet to play it looks now as if the Mormon team was the winner. Of course something might happen as does often times in sports and the Methodists may yet be the winners, but if the Y. M. C. A. team plays to form the remainder of the season the cup is theirs.

The basket shooting of Rollo Lyman and the stellar work of Ben at guard and Elwood Lyman at the center position showed them up as bright lights for their team. R. Lyman made nine points in the game and his brother seven. Waldo Stoddard, who is the most promising basket ball player in La Grande, did fast heady work while he was in the game.

Captain Wright of the Methodist team, who far exceeds any guard in La Grande, played the star role for his team. He played forward in last night's game and caged two of the baskets and a foul. His floor work surpassed that of any of the other men on his team. Smith, the rangy forward of the Methodist, aggregation, did great work during the game in losing the ball from difficult angles into the basket. He was able to cage the ball three times, thus making six points for his team.

Ross, a new man, on the team showed that he had seen considerable experience in basket ball, for in the last half, the only part of the game in which he played, he made five points. The opposition, is that, had the Methodists played Ross the whole game they would have won, for in the last half, with Ross in the game, they made nine points to the M. I. A.'s seven points.

The Baptists Again Losers
The game between the Presbyterians and the Baptists ended after a rough and fast game with the Presbyterians leading with the score 41 to 16. The score does not show how hard the Baptist team played, but in the beginning of each half they had the game their own way. After five minutes of play the Presbyterians took the ball and from then on it was theirs for keeps.

Proctor and Kivette were neck and neck for honors up to the middle of the last half, when Proctor got his shooters aimed and then it was no trouble for him to cage the ball whenever he was in shooting distance of the basket. Captain Kivette showed exceptional ability at floor work and in passing to the man near the basket who was free to throw. Lynch played a good game at guard.

The team work for the Baptist team was not up to standard last night due to the absence of Floyd Chandler and Howard Ball and the Keeney-Heidenreich combination at the forwards did not work as well because Heidenreich played center. The work of Keeney and Heidenreich however when they did get a chance with the ball made it do as they said. Keeney caged four of the baskets for his team. The Baptist team, although it has been defeated every time, will come out at the end of the season with the feeling that they fought all the time and only lost each game after a hard fight. What better could be said of a team than that they "fought the good fight."

FOREST SERVICE WORK

PORTLAND, April 2.—New drive ways, bridges, canals and drift fences are included in the plans of the forest service for improving the grazing ranges in national forests in Oregon and Washington. District Forester Cecil has announced. Forty-three bridges, forty-six trails and driveways, twenty-four corrals and forty-three drift fences already have been built to facilitate the handling of stock on the national forests of the district, he said. Water development has been made in 296 places.

The value of water development is illustrated by the Chubb lake range, on Deschutes national forest, which formerly supported no stock because water was lacking. A deep well equipped with a gasoline pump now provides sufficient water for 600 cattle and several more wells are to be sunk at intervals of about six miles, which it is estimated will equip the range to care for 3,000 more cattle.

ANYONE CAN BE LONDON DENTIST

LONDON, April 3.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) Butchers, drillers and turners are practicing dentistry in England. The only restriction, aside from possible damage suits, is that the "operator" does not call himself a "dentist" or "dental practitioner." It is unnecessary to register and anyone may start in the business.

This condition with its resultant health injuries has long been discussed in medical organizations without remedy but at last it has been investigated by a governmental committee. The whole system is criticized and the many American dentists in London are hopeful that Parliament will standardize the practice of dentistry as it has medicine and at the same time, recognize dentistry as a profession. There is no such recognition now.

Some of the American dentists in London enjoy an exclusive clientele but the reputation of the United States for good dentistry has been seized upon by unqualified persons in their flamboyant advertisements. They may and do advertise "American dentistry" and escape the technicalities of the law by not using the word "dentist."

The Departmental Committee of the Dentists Act shows how the "operators" work. One had twenty embezzlers some of whom carried their tools with them as they could "operate" at the home of the victim. Another made a specialty of correcting the front teeth of young women—usually marriage workers with newly found wealth. The system was to extract or saw off the objectionable teeth and fit new ones.

Large profits are made and there

is a constant flow of recruits to the rank of unqualified operators while the number of licensed dentists has not increased in fifteen years. The committee's principal recommendations are:

Prohibition of the practice of dentistry by persons not registered. Establishment of a public dental service. Increased grants to dental schools. Provision for dental treatment for expectant mothers and children under five. Adequate system of school dental treatment.

LONDON, April 3.—Infliction of penal servitude as a punishment for bigamists has been suggested by a Scottish judge and by the Common Serjeant at Old Bailey. The sergeant in imposing a sentence of one year's imprisonment upon an offender upon and approved the suggestion of the Scottish judge and added that bigamy "is now becoming a very serious offense."

Should Win the Flag.
PORTLAND, April 3.—The enviable record that Oregon has made in preceding loans and the thoroughness of the organization effected at the conferences of county chairmen and directors last week are believed to be the stimulus to efficiency when the date for subscriptions to the Victory Liberty Loan is reached. Treasury department officials have offered as an incentive to the state first in completing subscription the large flag that floated over the capitol building at Washington during the history-making period of the war. Oregon should win this flag.
