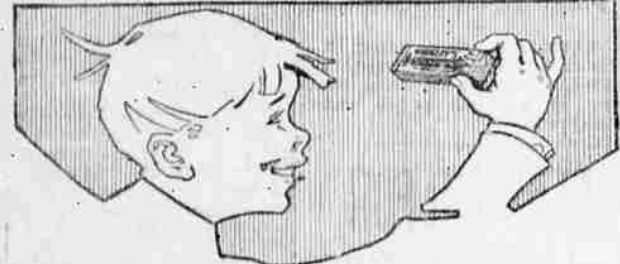

## NEW YORK IS FULL OF PERIL

RETURNING DOUGHBOYS ACQUIRE DODGING HABIT.

Metropolis Was Literally Swamped On Occasion of Reception at the 27th Division.

NEW YORK, April 7.—The 42nd that a doughboy was helped across the Hindenburg Line, and for his life in the streets of New York seems ludicrously to be initiated, it did to me until I learned that it was a serious fact.

I first noticed it on 42nd as I was about to dash across the street in front of a floor of a hotel with the typical recklessness of the seasoned metropolitan. Several others, including two women, were doing likewise with hardly a glance at the threatening cars. We all ran to the despite of traffic officers.

But on the curb stood three dough boys, one of whom had started across beside me but had been snatched back with a cry of alarm, by his comrades. All wore service stripes. I mentioned the obviously incongruous incident to a returned officer later. "They were probably from Texas or Montana," he added. "But even at that, you'd think trench life would have cured 'em."

"Just the contrary," my friend assured me. "They've acquired an almost incurable habit of dodging things that will stick for a good while yet. Every man who's seen service, however brave, has that experience. I'm a native New Yorker and before I went over there I thought no more of crossing Fifth avenue and 42nd street than of strolling in an open field. Now I almost need a special escort by the traffic officer, like a nice old lady from the country."

The sneers that we comparatively law-abiding citizens accord our police forces at times are not always shared by the professional crooks. Thomas Winters, expert burglar, to witness. His plea that eight months he spent in New York city dodging the police should be considered an time served on his original sentence of eight years failed, however, to move the board of parole, and Thomas must serve eight months more in Sing Sing prison before he can gain his liberty.

Winters, with "Boston Eddie" Kelly escaped from Sing Sing prison two years ago. Kelly is still at large. He is a bank burglar. Winters told the board of parole that the eight months he was at large was the worst he ever experienced.

Even the metropolis, big as it is and renowned as it is to handling crowds, can occasionally be swamped. Such an occasion was the reception of New York's 27th division last week. Despite its more than three miles of grandstands along the line of march only a small percentage of those who applied for seats were accommodated and almost as small a percentage of those who sought a place at the curb ever got in sight of it. The police fought in vain to keep the way clear for the marchers.

The harassed police even had to take up tree-climbing in the discharge of their duties. The trees of the various parks along the route offered irresistible temptation to numerous sailors and in many instances they refused to come down until an officer climbed up after them.

Profiteering was by no means a minor feature of the day. One cynic pointed out that immediately beneath one stand seats in which were selling for anything from \$5 to \$50, shone the slogan of the W. S. S. drive—"Patriotism and Profit."

Incidentally, the subway alone carried 1,300,000 persons during the day, while the elevated lines carried 1,200,000 more.

This year we cannot enjoy even our usual spring travel feeling to the full. Let a town develop the familiar old drowsy sensation and a desire to stroll out in the park and doze on a sunny bench, and he is at once filled with alarm. Instead of strolling back with his feet on the sill of an open window and enjoying a wistful dream of bobbing trout streams and green salt courses, he slips on his hat and rushes to his doctor to make sure that he is not coming down with the sleeping-sickness nose! Oh, my!

At a club luncheon the other day, at which a western millionaire was present, we were complimented of the price we had to pay for bread here in New York.

"I'd like to remind you," said the millionaire, "that the time when white bread was a mere luxury obtainable only by the well-to-do. Now, thanks to the opening of rich western plains by a network of railroads, it is available at everybody's table. I've even heard people complain that increased freight-rates were responsible for the increases in the cost of bread, as if the general rise in all prices were not enough

to account for it. I have only to remind you that railroad freight charges for 50-cent loaves of bread all the way from Minneapolis to New York for a price equivalent to the cost of six or three loaves. The actual freight on the whole barrel is fifty-eight cents. If we divide this fifty-eight cents among the loaves, instead of charging it up to six, we find that every ten-cent loaf which comes to the breakfast table has paid the railroad's freight charge of two one-thousandths of one cent."

### FISHERMEN HOPEFUL

Record Catch of Salmon Expected at Bristol Bay, Alaska.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 7.—Thirty-one vessels of the Alaskan Packers Company are to "mobilize" at Bristol Bay, Alaska during April and May for what the company expects to be a record catch. The company's salmon pack in 1918 was 1,200,000 pounds.

The "navy" of the Alaskan Packers calls for a total personnel of 5,000 fishermen and seamen. They will sweep the Alaskan waters for five months, and then will bring the pack to San Francisco for marketing in all parts of the civilized world.

The great fleet will be minus one vessel which accompanied it last year, the Star of Poland, which was wrecked off the Japanese coast while operating for the United States shipping board. Two other vessels of the fleet, the Star of Lapland and the Star of Zealand, are said by officials of the company to be the two biggest steel fishing vessels afloat. All of the vessels are sail propelled.

The vessels will clear from here on different dates during April and will all report to the common Bristol bay anchorage before beginning the five month season.

### MANY WOMEN HOLD OFFICE

SALT LAKE CITY, April 7.—With one exception every county in Utah has elected a woman to fill either a county office or to be a member of the legislature, and this is believed to be the largest number of women officials in any state in the Union. Twenty-five counties have at least one office filled by women, while Salt Lake county has three women representatives and one woman senator in the state legislature.

In Garfield county women hold the offices of recorder and clerk; a woman fills the office of clerk, recorder and auditor in Morgan county; women hold the offices of treasurer and recorder in Piute and Sevier counties and in Wayne county women hold the office of clerk, auditor and treasurer.

Kane and Wasatch county treasurers are in charge of women and recorders in eleven other counties are of the feminine sex.

### Y. W. C. A. COUNCIL TO SAIL

Committee to Discuss Women's Problems With European Leaders.

NEW YORK, April 7.—The Women's Industrial commission, which the national war work council of the Young Women's Christian association is sending abroad to meet labor leaders in England, France, Italy and Belgium in order to discuss labor problems affecting women, will sail from here for England next Wednesday on the Noordam, it was announced Sunday night.

The commission expects to spend about 10 days in each country and to return to the United States early in June.
