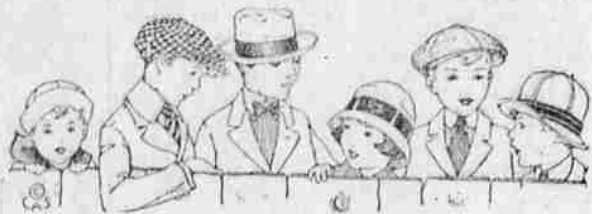

ITALIANS ARE BLAMED FOR SPALATO INCIDENT

Serbian Dispatch Says Allied Commission Fixes Responsibility for Trouble.

PARIS, April 9.—An official Serbian telegram from Belgrade says that the special commission of American and allied officers has terminated its inquiry into the Spalato incident of March 8, when armed Italian sailors wounded Serbian civilians and soldiers.

The commission, according to this dispatch, considers that responsibility for the incident rests on the Italian naval commander, who had approved the arrest of civilians by sailors, who were armed, though not on duty.

From Serbian sources comes the information also that during the last few days the Italians have arrested a number of Jugo-Slav deputies, doctors, priests and teachers in Istria, Trieste and other places, all of whom have been deported.

The Jugo-Slav committee in Paris on March 16 issued a statement that grave disturbances had occurred at Spalato, Dalmatia, where, it was asserted, Italian sailors had fought the inhabitants with knives and other weapons, killing or wounding several persons. Eventually the sailors were driven back to their vessels.

LURED SHIP TO DOOM

Avers Lusitania Was Sunk by Deceitful Wireless Message.

The Lusitania was lured to her fate by a deceitful wireless message sent by the German submarine that sank her, the message being in the British radio code, a copy of which had been secretly obtained from a Canadian by von Papen, German agent, according to testimony given before the senate committee, while it was investigating expenditures of German money for propaganda purposes in the United States.

The testimony was given by General B. Beane, ex-while business agent for the wealthy Mrs. Maude A. Kline, admitted her murder at Concord, N. C. in the summer of 1917. Means admitted he had been a confidential agent of Captain Boyd; that he had access to his books and records; and that Boyd had entrusted to him his file of confidential papers which he was sent out of this country.

The wireless message, Means testified, advised the Lusitania that the German U-boat sending the message was a British convoy vessel and instructed this big passenger ship to alter her course to meet it.

The code had been in possession of German submarine commanders for some time, Means said, and they merely hid their time until they could employ it against a vessel whose sinking would be "worth while."

ENGINEERS ARE PUZZLED

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, March 12.—(By Mail)—Soundings for the proposed government railroad bridge across the Seward River, 150 miles north of Anchorage, have disclosed a geologic formation that is worrying construction engineers. Extreme fine sand, in which are mixed large boulders, constitutes the bed of the stream, and at a depth of thirty feet the sounding drill has not yet reached bedrock.

The boulders refuse to resist the drill. Instead, when touched by it, they sink into the loose sand.

14 YEAR-OLD GIRL FACES MURDER TRIAL



Felice Gambino, 14-year-old New York girl is thought to be the youngest child ever to face a murder charge. When attacked at her home by Thomas Train, she took a revolver her father had in the house and shot the man dead, giving her up to the police immediately after the killing. It is thought to be the first time that a child has ever faced trial on a charge liable to punishment by death. It is believed the case will be discussed and the girl placed in care of some society.

BUTTE REPUBLICANS

Majority of nearly two to one the entire Republican municipal ticket, with its possible exception of one alderman, was elected yesterday. W. T. Soden, Republican majority candidate, carried fifteen of the sixteen wards over his Democratic opponent, Capt. William Cutts. Herman Strassburger, for treasurer and H. J. Grimes for police magistrate had corresponding success.

Thirteen precincts of the city of Butte gave Stodden 3988, Cutts 2068. The election was quiet. Voting machines were used. Registration was slightly in excess of 15,000, and the vote about 9000.

More than 1000 men gathered at a local baseball park this afternoon in protest against the action of the supreme court in dismissing the petition of W. F. Dunn to be placed on the official ballot as an independent candidate for mayor.

Among the speakers were former United States District Attorney Wheeler and Dunn, both of whom claimed that the Democratic nomination and his friends had "stolen" the nomination from Dunn.

Rumors came to the city hall that raids on the polling places had been planned. Chief of Police Murphy said he was prepared for any eventuality. United States soldiers stationed here were in readiness for orders, but were not seen on the streets.

MUST TURN TO CHURCH

Bishop German Holds It Is True Antidote for Evils Threatening Nation

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 9.—America must look to the church as an antidote for the evils which are threatening the best in our economic, social, moral and intellectual life, declared Bishop Daniel Gorman of Boise, Idaho, in his sermon at the consecration of Bishop Edmund Heelan here Tuesday.

The church is the one indestructible force which can keep the stream of life pure and rightly interpret the meaning of man's earthly existence, he said.

The industrial world is like a smoldering volcano, the bishop said. Escaping steamers realize we are facing grave problems. Materialism is largely in control of the age, he said.

Arrangements have been made to make this one of the most impressive and beautiful programs ever held for a like event on the mountain top, almost a mile above sea level. Hundreds attend the services each year. Lodging will be provided for many outdoor visitors at an inn near the summit. The call of the bugle will herald the event as dawn rises. A procession from the tavern to Easter rock, situated near Inspiration Point will open the services, which will include hymns, invocation and a brief sermon, delivered by a Los Angeles minister.
