AGREEMENT REACHED ON THE FIRE CHIEF

but accept the resignation and made a motion to that effect, but there was immediate seconding of the motion and the matter went under discussion. There was considerable talk on both sides for the next hour, Dr. Brownson, president of the board, taking the stand he has held since the matter first came up and favoring the arguments of the volunteers. The volunteers at one time became somewhat personal in their remarks concerning the members of the force, alleging inefficiency, and as some of the paid men were present an altercation in that quarter was threatened. The resolutions from the Ad club was read to the board and this policy was a potent factor in bringing about the final settlement. Commissioners Grady and McKennon both agreed with the city manager that the city was getting a quite satisfactory service from the fire department at the wages now being paid, and it took a lot of talking to persuade them that \$75, \$50 and \$100 a month, which are the amounts the chief and his two helpers have been drawing down, is not sufficient remuneration for the work. It was finally accomplished, however, and a motion was passed ordering that the former chief, Chas. Marchison, be re-engaged at a salary of \$125 monthly, with the privilege of paying his helpers more than the wages at present allowed, if he finds it necessary. An ordinance sanctioning the increase of the fireman's pay will be prepared and passed at a later meeting. This decision was quite satisfactory to the volunteers and their resignation was accordingly withdrawn. The new chief will take charge as

soon as he can secure his release from his present position. Other Resolutions Passed. One of the four resolutions passed at the meeting was of considerable importance, affecting property owners who are delinquent in their payments on assessments on street improvement. The resolution instructs and directs the city manager to demand from the occupants possession of property sold for delinquent assessment, wherever such action is necessary to secure payment. Another resolution, regarding North Second street property in Improvement District No. 27, directs the city manager to notify all delinquent assessment debtors that their property will be sold if payment is not made at once. The city, however, will allow payment of such delinquent indebtedness by installments, if application for the privilege is made within sixty days of the notification date. Payment in ten annual installments will be allowed if the parties pay the already due assessments and accrued interest up to date when the last installment would have been due if application to pay on installments had originally been made. Two other resolutions were passed authorizing the building of sidewalks along the east side of lots 2 and 4, in block 14 of the Riverside addition, on the west side of Fourth street; and along the east side of lots 7 and 8 in block 2 of the same addition. DOCTOR KARKEET HAS NARROW ESCAPE

Exciting Experience of Dr. Karkeet, Formerly of Hot Lake Sanatorium

The following from the Oregon Journal will be of local interest inasmuch as Dr. Karkeet was formerly with the Hot Lake Sanatorium. The Journal says: Cut off from other escape by flames eating their way through the upstairs hall of his home, Dr. Robert B. Karkeet, of 1925 Beulah Vista terrace, King's Heights, jumped from the second story window of his home this morning with a child under each arm. Mrs. Karkeet, confused by smoke and unable to reach the stairs, then slid down a low roof and dropped, almost falling from smoke and fright into her husband's arms. The doctor and his wife were awakened by smoke. Mrs. Karkeet attempted to run down the stairs to the street, while Karkeet ran to the children's room through the flames, but before he could get back with the children, his way was cut off. Dr. Karkeet grabbed a loaded revolver, fired all the shots with the hope of arousing the neighbors and then jumped out of the window with the children. The wife had run back in the meantime, and climbed from a window to the roof over the kitchen.

NOVEL BY ZANE GREY PICTURED ON SCREEN

Readers of the popular Zane Grey novels are divided in their verdict as to which is his greatest, but undoubtedly the first to catch the general public and the longest to retain its vogue is "Riders of the Purple Sage."
