**CITY MANAGER
MAKES REPORT**

Last week being clean up week the street force has been very busy gathering up rubbish from the streets and alleys and hauling it away. Already some 155 loads have been removed. The old dumping ground near Spring and First has been cleared up, the brush and boxes burned and the remainder of the refuse covered with earth and leaves. No further dumping will be allowed on this ground. At present the force are gathering rubbish on the north side. This will probably require several days more. In addition to this teams have been employed since the rain of Saturday in dragging the streets again. Some cross walks have been put in and a few walks repaired. As soon as the cleaning up is finished we expect to renew the campaign against broken and worn out sidewalks. Those that are not repaired by the owners will have to be repaired by the street force and the cost charged to the abutting property. The men in the water department have been employed in repairing leaks and making some changes in the pipes and meters. The police department report five arrests for the week, one for drunkenness, three for traffic violations and one juvenile delinquent. The amount of fines collected was \$90.50.

In the recorder's office there was received the above amount from the fines, and licenses and warrants issued as follows: Building permits, 1; day license, 2; rooming house license, 1; Warrants on the general fund \$2,592.99.

The treasurer reports: receipts \$1,979.25, disbursements for warrants and interest paid \$419.10. There were no fire calls last week and consequently nothing to report from that department except the addition of one man to the force, Mr. James Neville. Mr. Neville is an experienced car man and for the present will act as extra driver.

I have been unable as yet to secure a satisfactory man for chief of the department, Mr. Murchison having refused to accept the position except under conditions which I did not feel that I was justified in granting without the endorsement of the commission. As there has been some controversy and apparently some misunderstanding regarding the present condition of the fire department I desire to say at this time that all of the men now employed on the force are competent car men and two have had experience in fire department work.

I have had the department inspected by W. A. Bonham, one of our former fire chiefs, and the men explained as to their qualifications as firemen. Mr. Bonham reports everything in good condition and the men competent to fill the position they are holding. There have been other applications for positions on the force but I am not prepared at this time to make any recommendation for the position of chief.

The treasurer's report for the month of March shows a considerable surplus of funds on hand and I would recommend that all available be used for the retiring outstanding warrants.

The Athletic Division of the Union County Ad. Club arranged a very attractive Athletic programme for the Arcade theatre in this city Friday night, April 18th.

Police Gazette records show he wrestled Ed "Strangler" Lewis, a two hour draw. Has wrestled Joe Stecker, Earl Caddock, Dr. Roller and many other heavy notables in the east. In his match with Frank Gotch, he broke champion's leg, putting him out of commission for several months.

He comes well recommended from the east, bearing the distinction of being one of the most brilliant wrestlers in the heavyweight class. Ad. Santel, the undisputed 175 pound champion of the world, is well known in La Grande, having wrestled here in November 1917, defeating Jack O'Neill in straight falls, drawing the largest crowd ever attracted by a sporting event in this city.

The committee arranging this match have the welfare of this community at heart and are desirous of making the initial show the best sporting card ever offered to the local public.

After the expenses of the entertainment are paid the net proceeds will go to the recreation fund of the Union County Ad. club and will be used to improve and beautify some portion of the city thereby benefiting the whole community.
