PREPARE TO FEED RUSSIA

Doctor Nansen Asked to Head Neutral Commission to Investigate

LONDON, April 11.—Herbert Hoover, director general of the international relief organization, has requested Dr. Fridtjof Nansen, head of the Norwegian food mission to the United States, to become chief of an international neutral commission to investigate the possibility of feeding Russia on condition of the cessation of hostilities in Russia, according to a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company from Copenhagen. The dispatch says that 16,000,000 pounds monthly will be required to carry out the program.

CLAIMS YOUNGEST MARINES

CITIBANK, Mont., April 11.—Citibank claims the youngest marine that enlisted with the colors in the great war in the person of John H. Pearce, aged 16, who when but a few months past his fifteenth birthday went to Helena, ostensibly to visit a sister but instead enlisted in the marine. After receiving training at various camps, he was sent to Great France, with the Fifth Regiment, from there going to the Champagne front. From this time on young Pearce was in the thick of the fighting. He saw service at the Mont Blanc ridge, in the Argonne forest, and in the battle through No Man's land to reach his destination. While being flat on his back for protection, he had the neck on his back blown completely away, was twice buried by earth from high explosive shells. He was one of 25 marines out of a company of 200 near the Meuse that escaped either death or wounds and was one of the company that crossed the Meuse on a ponton bridge that was blown to bits after the marines had crossed. Here the lad was rescued. On Nov. 1, 1918, near St. George, after a battle and while his company was "holding up," he had the pleasure of receiving the surrender of five Germans. Pearce is nearly six feet tall and weighs 160 pounds.

BELGIANS RECEIVED CATTLE

LONDON.—(By Mail)—Six hundred short-horn cattle of the very best breed have been presented by the Royal Agricultural Society of Great Britain to the people of Belgium, and 200 of them have already reached farms in the vicinity of Bruges. The remainder will follow in a few weeks. The cattle, which are valued at \$200,000, will be accompanied by the near future with additional gifts, after which more cattle are to be sent to Serbia and France to take the places of the livestock killed or carried away by the German invaders. Money for the gifts is being collected in all the English cattle raising counties, and farmers of this movement expect the fund to reach \$1,250,000 within the next few months.

WOMEN DOCTORS IN BALKANS

ATHENS.—(By Mail)—Eleven women doctors attached to the American Women's Hospital, of New York, and fifteen United States army surgeons have been assigned to the American Red Cross for civil relief work in the Balkans. These doctors, who are in charge of Major Burke C. Hamilton, of Goshen, N. Y., medical director of the American Red Cross Commission to the Balkans, will be sent to Serbia, Montenegro and Albania, where there is reported to be much illness. They will be provided with liberal supplies of medicines.

LLOYD GEORGE PROMISES STATEMENT WEDNESDAY

LONDON, April 11.—Premier Lloyd George hopes to return to London from Paris next Tuesday and to make a statement regarding the peace conference in the house of commons on Wednesday. This announcement was made in the house Thursday by Edward Shortt, home secretary.

FLOATING MINES

A GREAT DANGER

Menge Is Especially to Be Found to the Black Sea.

CONSTANTINOPLE.—(By Mail)—Floating mines in the Dardanelles and Sea of Marmora still constitute a great danger to navigation. Several ships have been lost since the armistice through mine explosions. The armistice required Turkey to indicate all mines, but it has not been possible in all cases to give their exact position. Minesweepers have been at work for some time, but naval authorities say it will be many months before vessels can proceed through the straits with safety. No navigation is permitted at night. On passenger vessels lifeboats drills are held regularly just as in days when submarine menaced the seas.

Even in the broad stretches of the Aegean Sea the greatest precautions are taken against floating mines. In certain areas passengers are required to wear life preservers, and narrow lanes of travel have been marked out for pilots to follow.

But it is in the Black Sea that the greatest danger exists. Not only are there numerous floating mines there, but extensive unmarked mine fields laid indiscriminately by the Germans, Russians and Bolsheviks. There are a constant menace to shipping. The steamer bearing the American Red Cross mission to Rumania narrowly missed a floating mine while proceeding to Constantza. Often these mines are carried down by the swift current in the Bosphorous Straits to the Sea of Marmora, where they are an ever-present danger to the hundreds of naval and merchant vessels.

Naval authorities say it will be several years before the waters of Europe are entirely free of floating mines. Many of the German mines destroyed by Allied travelers were found to have been moored by rope. When the rope rotted the mines broke from their anchorage and drifted in many cases to the main line of steamer travel.

JEWEL COLLECTION RESTORED

PARIS.—(By Mail)—The lavish jewel collection of the Louvre will soon be on exhibition again. The collection was removed from the Louvre when the Germans made their threatening drive toward Paris. M. Dallery, curator of the museum, took the jewels away with him personally to Bordeaux, carrying in his vest pocket the most precious of the stones, a jewel valued at \$2,000,000, and known as the famous Regent gem.

Revised Lists Show 273,105 Casualties in the American Forces

WASHINGTON, April 10.—The following revised table of casualties among the American expeditionary forces, based upon lists to date, was issued Wednesday by the war department:

- Killed in action, (including 381 lost at sea), 32,292.
- Died of wounds, 13,429.
- Died of disease, 22,505.
- Died of accident and other causes, 4686.
- Wounded in action, (85 per cent returned), 195,902.
- Missing in action, (not including prisoners released and returned), 4900.
- Total to date, 273,105.

GREAT LAKES FILL SHIP ORDERS

CLEVELAND, Ohio, April 10.—The shipyards of the Great Lakes have been steadily turning out steamers for the Emergency Fleet Corporation during the mild winter and when the canals between Lake Erie and Montreal open soon after April 15 there will be a rush of down-bound vessels.

Orders call for the delivery of more than 250 steamers in 1919. It is estimated that 199 vessels building for the government for salt water service will be ready to leave.

The American Shipbuilding Company, with several yards on the lakes, has orders for 111 steamers, 45 of which will be ready to sail at the opening. The boats are being turned out at Superior, South Chicago, Detroit, Lorain, Cleveland and Buffalo.

Contracts for 44 steamers, many of which will be ready soon, are held by the Great Lakes Engineering Works, Yards at Toledo, Duluth, Saginaw and Mantowoc also will have a number of vessels ready when navigation opens.

It will be late in the season before all the shipyards finish their contracts with the Emergency Fleet Corporation.

WILD GAME INCREASING

GILMAN, Mont., April 11.—Wild game is multiplying in this vicinity. Elk by the hundred may be seen in the North Fork country, two trappers recently reporting 200 in one herd. The trappers said mountain sheep, protected under the game laws, are expanding in number. Trapping is good and furs bring high prices.

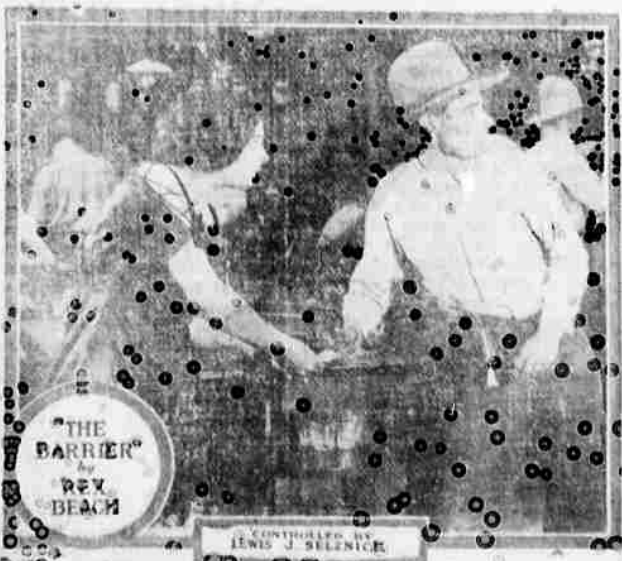
