But the lion put up such a fight that they were obliged to kill it. Neither man was hurt. The animal's pelt measured 19 feet, 7 inches. The men estimated the weight at 300 pounds.

While trailing the animal, the hunters passed the remains of three deer which the lion presumably had killed, one of them eating only a small portion of each.
