La Grande Presbyterians learned with pleasure a few days ago that Rev. James A. Smith, of Concordia, Kans., will come to La Grande to become the pastor of the church here. Rev. Smith spent two Sundays here recently, with the result that on the day of his departure to return east the congregation met and voted to extend to him a call to this field. A wire from Mr. Smith conveying his acceptance of the call was received during the week. It is expected that he will arrive to take up the work in this city during the latter part of May.

Meets Soldier Husband Here

Paid Over \$2000 for Five Cows
Mention was made a few days ago of the purchase by Garrett Taal for some registered Shorthorn cows at the recent auction in Portland. The Live Stock Reporter gives a list of the purchases as well as the names of the animals. Mr. Taal bid five head at an aggregate price of \$1885, the highest in the lot being bid in a \$489, and another at \$449. Adding to the first cost the expenses of the trip, and bringing the cattle home, it is easy to see where over \$2000 will go out for the five purchases made. Mr. Taal put up a sign last fall, the first in his neighborhood, and now with the foundation well laid he will not be long in having one of the best herds of Shorthorns in the state.

New Labor Organization

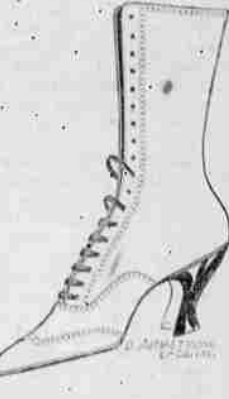

The dispatches announce that Base Hospital No. 46 is on the way from France and is now in New York April 15. Two La Grande people are members of this unit. They are Dr. (now captain) H. M. Bouvy and Miss Ellen Grady. Dr. S. A. Roe, who is associated with Dr. Bouvy in practice at this place, recently received a letter from him in which he stated that he expects to return to La Grande very soon after he is discharged from the service. Dr. Bouvy was commissioned as first lieutenant and called as one of the specialists with Base Hospital No. 46 last June. In October he was promoted to a captain and placed in charge of the central clinic at Baziolles, France, where special and difficult cases were referred from seven base hospitals. Capt. Bouvy will probably return to La Grande about the middle of May. Miss Grady is the daughter of Conductor and Mrs. H. C. Grady of this city. She is well known as a competent nurse and her services were tendered to the government very early in the war. She will probably return home as soon as possible after reaching New York.

Invites Ladies to Luncheon
John Collier, city manager, who was appointed last Tuesday to act as chairman of the Ad club Tuesday luncheon this week, announces that he plans to make this occasion a "La Grande Day," introducing topics of civic improvement.
