

25 BILLION TO BE PAID BY GERMANY

FIVE BILLION MUST BE PAID IN CASH OR ITS EQUIVALENT BY MAY 1, 1921.

OTHER 20 BILLIONS COVERED BY BONDS

Interest on the Bonds Will Be Two or Three Per Cent Until 1926 and Five Per Cent After That Date—Other Obligations Will Be Fixed in the Peace Treaty.

(By Associated Press to The Observer)

PARIS, April 14.—Germany under the peace treaty must pay five billion dollars in cash or its equivalent in commodities before May 1, 1921. She must also issue immediately to the allied or associated governments \$20,000,000,000 in interest-bearing bonds. The interest on the bonds until 1925 will be either two or three per cent. Afterward the rate will be five per cent. Other obligations will be fixed also.

The council of four did not meet today. President Wilson conferred with Premier Orlando and Italian leaders on the Adriatic problem.

The peace conference has agreed upon the date when German delegates will be called into conference, it is reported. It is believed the date will be before April 20.

The proposed Japanese and French amendments are not in the covenant, but they may renew the questions at the plenary session.

London Not Enthusiased.

LONDON, April 14.—The summary of the league of nations evokes no enthusiasm in the morning papers. Some declare it is less satisfactory than the first draft.

CAIRO RIOTS RESULT IN 138 CASUALTIES

CAIRO, Egypt, April 14.—In two days of rioting here, ending at noon Thursday, 38 persons were killed and 160 wounded. It is announced in Friday's official communique. Armenians were chiefly the objects of the mob's attacks. In rioting in Alexandria three persons were killed and six seriously injured Saturday morning, while a continuation of attacks on the troops resulted in the killing of 17 other persons during the afternoon.

SEVEN DEATHS IN RACE WAR

THREE OFFICERS HONORED

Two Awarded D. S. C., While Third Is Given French War Cross.

LONDON, April 14.—At an imposing ceremony on the parade ground near the American military headquarters Saturday, Major General John Riddle, the commander in the United Kingdom, decorated Col. Harry F. Ridd of Los Angeles of the quartermaster corps, and Colonel Francis F. Longley of the 25th engineers, with the distinguished service medals. At the request of the French government General Riddle presented the war cross to Second Lieutenant James V. Slade of the Second engineers.

AN APPEAL TO REPUBLICANS TO RALLY TO VICTORY LOAN

NEW YORK, April 14.—An appeal by Will H. Hays, chairman of the Republican National committee, for republicans and the "Republican press" to give their united support to the Victory Loan, was issued here last night.

"Again the call for the change has sounded," said Mr. Hays' appeal. "This is not for the fighting men at the fighting front. But to the rest of the real test has come; to those whose province it has been to form the second line, and to whose credit it is recorded that they, too, attained every objective; to those from every class,

creed and political faith, who acted in that unselfish co-operation which brought the fighting men the support that made so much for the complete vindication of our institutions; to the men and women of America, who do not fail, has this call come.

"Our first duty as Republicans today is that duty which we have never failed and never will fail to anticipate and discharge—our duty as Americans."

"To that end we will abandon all other activities to aid in the Victory Loan until its success has been accomplished."

BAVARIA TURNS AGAINST SOVIETS

SENTIMENT STEADILY GROWING
IN WAY OF OPPOSITION

Third Army Headquarters at Munich Will Establish a Military Dictatorship.

MUNICH, April 14.—A report from the Third army headquarters at Munich says that the garrison will establish a military dictatorship supporting the Hoffman ministry which the soviet regime expects to offset Action to recover the capital from the soviet forces is promising favorably.

Dr. Adolf Lapp, who was appointed commissioner for foreign affairs in the soviet cabinet, has been placed in an insane asylum. He is reported to have been there twice before.

BERLIN, April 14.—Sentiment among a large proportion of the people of Munich and of almost the entire remainder of Bavaria is steadily growing against the alleged ruthlessness, incompetence and strange methods and decrees of the new soviet regime. Rationing, Schweinfurt, Furth and Augsburg have capitulated to the old regime and disavowed the allurement of the soviet which led them temporarily from the fold.

Other towns are expected to return to the old alliance soon, leaving the communists to face the opposition of the bourgeoisie in Munich on the one hand and of the peasants on the other.

IDaho COUNTY WANTS ROADS

BLACKFOOT, Ida., April 14.—Reports from sixteen out of nineteen voting precincts in Bingham county indicate that the \$600,000 road bonds carried by 90 per cent. Three precincts, Riverside, Taber and Springfield, did not cast a negative vote. The Socialists offered the only opposition. This election guarantees the expenditure of \$1,000,000 on Bingham county roads this year.

ATLANTIC FLEET OFF NEW YORK

REVOLUTION IN SERBIA REPORTED BY HUNGARY

LONDON, April 14.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Budapest dated Saturday says an unconfirmed report has been received there that a revolution has broken out in Serbia and that the troops are fraternizing with the Hungarian Red Guards.

ST. LOUIS WINS A. T. & T. CO. WIRE BOWLING TOURNEY

TOLEDO, April 14.—St. Louis with a team score of 2642 won the American Telephone & Telegraph company bowling tournament by wire, according to figures received here Saturday night from sixteen cities where the competition was in progress. Buffalo was second with 2526; New York was third with 2504 and Philadelphia the fourth with 2458.

KOREAN ASKS AID OF ALLIES

PHILADELPHIA, April 14.—A petition has been filed by Kim Sik-Kim, Korean delegate to the peace conference at Paris, urging the allies' support to check the massacre of Koreans with the sympathy treatment, according to a cablegram received here.

NOTED WOMAN OF WEST DIES

MRS. PHOEBE A. HEARST, OF CALIFORNIA, SUCCEDES

Was Widow of Late Senator George Hearst and Mother of William H. Hearst, Publisher.

PLEASANTON, Cal., April 14.—Mrs. Phoebe Apperson Hearst, widow of the late George Hearst of California, and mother of William Randolph Hearst, the publisher, died at her home here Sunday, after an illness of several weeks. She was 75 years old.

Mrs. Hearst was known throughout the country for her philanthropic work.

Mrs. Hearst was with her mother when the end came. When it became apparent some time ago, that because of Mrs. Hearst's advanced age her illness probably would result fatally he hurried from New York to be with her. He was her only child.

Phoebe Apperson Hearst, gentle, refined, was of those hardy American pioneers who went into the west of trackless deserts and dangerous mountains, endured hardships and fought life's battles until won. She shared the hardships and adventures of her husband, the late Senator Hearst, who won millions from mines.

LIQUOR MAY GO THROUGH DRY STATE

WASHINGTON, April 14.—The supreme court has held that transportation of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes through a dry state is not prohibited under the Reed amendment.

TROTSKY HAS EYE EASTWARD

FRENCH GIRL IN DISGUISE IS EXPOSED BY SEASICKNESS

NEW YORK, April 14.—The trans-Atlantic K. I. Luckenbach, Turrialba and Hisco, arrived Sunday from France, bringing 2509 officers and enlisted men, 88 army nurses and one "negro stevedore," who proved, enroute to be Mlle. Alexandria Boyer of Marseilles, bride-elect of Michael Black of Muncie, Ind., a first-class boatswain's mate.

Mlle. Boyer traveled incognito for the first two days, until, according to soldiers on the Luckenbach, she became seasick and so pale that her heavy coating of burnt cork failed longer to deceive the boat's officers. She made the rest of the trip in the isolation ward and was turned over

to immigration officials on her arrival.

Her fiance, who arrived in the "brig," asserts the marriage, which was blocked by French "red tape," will be solemnized as soon as he can persuade immigration officials to release her and naval authorities to release him.

The Turrialba brought 88 nurses, recruited in all parts of the country and including detachments of the sixth evacuation hospital, the 67th, 115th and 22nd base hospitals, together with 10 casual officers.

Two officers and 30 casuals hailing from New York were aboard the Hisco.

MAY 1 CAUSES UNEASINESS

Paris Uncertain As to Manner in Which Day Will Be Celebrated

PARIS, April 14.—The approach of May 1 is arousing uneasiness as regards the manner in which that day, long notable in European labor annals, will be celebrated here. Some Parisians who are leaving the city for the Easter holiday intend to prolong their stay until after the first of the month.

At present the only thing known as to the probable scope of the program is that the labor unions and the general labor federation are planning a demonstration which may take the form of a general strike of all labor for 24 hours or a limited strike of the same length which would leave the public services inoperative.

GREEKS ENTER PROTEST

Alleged Activities of Italians in Epirus Arouses People.

SALONIKI, April 14.—The league of Greek refugees of northern Epirus has addressed to President Wilson and the allied premiers at Paris a protest against alleged activities by General Rossi, commander of Italian troops in Epirus, who is charged with having organized in that country demonstrations against the annexation of northern Epirus to Greece. The protest declares it is the desire of the people of Epirus that their country should be united to Greece and claims that the continued occupation of that region by Italian troops is unjustified.

FOUR BURNED BY GASOLINE

ONE OFFICER AND FOUR MEN
ON SUBMARINE CHASER

All Patients Taken to Hospital Where Recovery Appears to Be Very Doubtful.

SAN DIEGO, April 14.—One officer and four men aboard the submarine chaser 297 in port, were burned in a gasoline explosion Sunday afternoon. All five were taken to a hospital where, it is said, that all possibly have been fatally injured.

NEBRASKA GOVERNOR NAMES WOMAN ON CONTROL BOARD

LINCOLN, Neb., April 14.—Governor McKelvie Saturday night announced the appointment of Mrs. A. G. Peterson of Aurora as a member of the state board of control. It is one of the most important appointive positions in the state, having jurisdiction over all state institutions and the expenditure of funds for their maintenance. Mrs. Peterson, who is one of three members, is actively engaged in business at Aurora and is president of the P. E. O. sisterhood of Nebraska. Her appointment is made to become effective the first of July.

TOOK PATIENTS FROM AMERICAN HOSPITAL

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Tokio dispatches to the state department reported that gendarmes took from the Severance hospital at Seoul, an institution maintained by Americans, three Korean patients who were suffering from gunshot wounds inflicted by the police.

SUPREME COUNCIL AGREES ON ALLOTTING ENEMY SHIPS

PARIS, April 14.—The supreme economic council has announced an agreement between the associated governments providing that enemy tonnage, both that acquired before and since the armistice, would be divided among those governments, according to their ability to bring the ships into speedy use and in the case of passenger ships, according to their relative needs. This arrangement will not prejudice the ultimate disposition of the ships under the terms of the treaty of peace.

The vessels will fly the flag of the allied maritime council as well as the national flag of the country undertaking their management.

THY WILL SOON ARRIVE

Word received by Promoter John E. Anderson today from Ted Thy, conveys the information that the popular wrestler expects to be in this city in a day or two to prepare for the coming contest with Ad. Gustavo. The bout is regarded by both men as being of more than usual importance and is attracting a great deal of interest from the local sporting fraternity.

DIVISIONS OF 91ST ARRIVE

QUOTA FOR OREGON IS \$26,798,400

TOTAL VICTORY LOAN IS TO BE FOR FOUR AND A HALF BILLIONS OF DOLLARS

TO BE LAST OF GREAT
POPULAR CAMPAIGNS

Size of the Loan Is Very Much Less Than Had Been Anticipated by Financial Observers Who Expected the Amount to Be Six Billions, Based on Secretary's Statements.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 14.—Oregon's quota for the forthcoming Victory loan is officially set at \$26,798,400.

Terms of Loan.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Terms of the Victory loan were announced Sunday by Secretary Glass. They are: Amount, \$4,500,000,000, over-subscriptions to be rejected.

Interest, 4 1/2 per cent, for partially tax exempt notes, convertible into 3 1/2 per cent notes wholly tax exempt.

Maturity four years, with the treasury reserving the privilege of redeeming the notes in three years.

The 3 1/2 per cent notes to be issued later also may be converted subsequently back into 4 1/2 per cent notes.

The 4 1/2 per cent securities are to be exempt from state and local taxation, excepting estate and inheritance taxes and from normal rates of federal income taxes, the 3 1/2 per cent securities are exempt from all federal, state and local taxes except estate and inheritance taxes.

The size of the loan was much smaller than had been anticipated by most financial observers, who looked for an issue of about \$6,000,000,000, particularly in view of Secretary Glass' past statements that the loan would be \$5,000,000,000 or \$6,000,000,000.

Will Be Last Loan.

This will be the last Liberty loan, Secretary Glass explained, although there will be other issues of government securities to finance related war expenses. These will not be floated by popular campaigns.

None of the past issues of Liberty bonds are convertible into Victory loan notes, and there are no specific provisions in the terms of the Victory issue serving directly to maintain the market prices on past issues.

In many communities the selling campaign already has begun actively, without formal acceptance of subscriptions, said reports Sunday to the treasury, although the official opening date is April 21, one week from Monday. The drive will continue three weeks until May 10.
