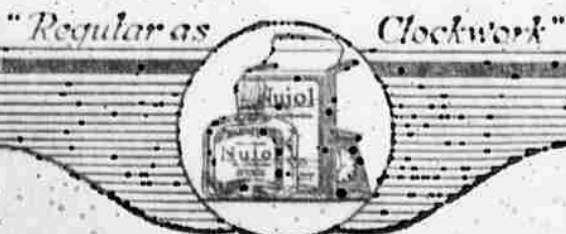

SOME FACTS IN REGARD TO SIBERIA

Country of Large Era and Ten Million Population, Most of Whom Are Russians.

OMSK, Siberia—(By Mail)—Siberia, which has forced world attention, by reason of the important political events there, includes all the Asiatic possessions of Russia, with the exception of the trans-Caspian and trans-Caucasian region and the important general of Turkestan whose capital, Tashkent, was captured by the Bolsheviks and whom American Vice-consul, Roger C. Treadwell, was arrested and left to languish in prison.

Since the Mongolian invasions in the thirteenth century, Siberia has been the home of many tribes, descended from that race. To the forefinger the Tartars are perhaps the most interesting. Their great center is Kazan though the National Tartar Council, which like Ukraine and other regions of Russia, seeks the development of its "national aspirations," is now located at Petropavlovsk, not far from Omsk. This is an account of Bolshevik terrorism.

The Tartars are true followers of Mahomet and their mosques are found in almost every city. They are estimated to number 1,600,000 in the districts of Kazan and Crimea. They are keen seekers after education and many Tartar boys and girls receive lessons in French, English and German from foreign instructors in places like Kazan, Samara and Ufa. The last two of these places were occupied several months ago by the Bolshevik armies. The Tartars have an oval face, black eyes, placed obliquely, and their skin is brown. Their costume is unusual, the distinguishing feature being their cap, over which is worn a tight fitting calotte, or skull cap.

A considerable number of Tartars live in the Altai mountains on the frontier of China. They are still nomads and given over to idolatry. Many of them worship the sun.

The people of the Mongolian race inhabiting Russia, either European or Siberian, should be generally divided into groups. The Finnish group is composed of Tartars, and smaller tribal peoples.

An important nomadic Mongolian

tribe is the Kirghis who live in the steppe regions of central and southern Siberia. They are nomads, with a million of both sexes, speak a Turkish dialect and are devoted nomadism. They are chiefly cattle raisers.

The Yakouts inhabit the region of Irkutsk, near Lake Baikal, and speak a language principally Turkish but partly Mongolian. They are idolatrous and live by the hunt and by the raising of cattle.

In the province of Tolouch, and generally in the north, even up to the Arctic ocean, are found the Voguls and the Ostiaks. They descend from ancient Finno-Uralic branches. Although in principle converted to Christianity, they have no real idea of the Christian religion and, in ancient times, practice Shamanism, the religion of their ancestors. Still other tribes are the Yakuts on the plateaus of the Altai, the Burjats in the trans-Baikal district, the Manchus in the Amur, and the Buryats on the Arctic borders where they engage in the raising of reindeer.

In the large cities like Harbin, Irkutsk and Omsk, Americans are struck by the large number of Burjats and Tartars who are drivers of public droskies. They seem to speak the Russian language indifferently and apparently hardly know the streets and different quarters of the city. They are distinctly Mongolian in type and have flat noses.

The present population of Siberia is estimated at ten million, as against a total Russian population of perhaps 180,000,000. Despite the numerous races and tribes mentioned above, the population of Siberia is mainly Russian, formed of peasants who migrated from European Russia when Siberia was reconquered and to some extent of the descendants of the unhappy people who were exiled to the field zone for political conspiracies and crimes.

CUPID HAS BEEN BUSY IN FRANCE

More Than Six Thousand Women Won By Men of American Expeditionary Force.

PARIS—(By Mail)—That Cupid was nearly busy as Mars with the members of the American Expeditionary Force and that romance bloomed in France in spite of war's alarums is shown by the fact that more than six thousand French women have been wooed and won by American soldiers within one year. The majority of the French girls who have become Americans through marrying men and officers of the American Expeditionary Force are stenographers, salesgirls or teachers with a sprinkling of peasant girls and those of the middle class or bourgeoisie.

The romances are in most cases very similar. A soldier would be billeted with a French family, a member of which would be a girl of marriageable age. Together they would delve into the intricacies of the French language, sign language being promptly superseded by a combination of Anglo-French gibberish.

The clean cut, healthy physique of the Americans, their politeness and generosity would appeal to the heart of the French girl who saw in the American the realization of her dreams. As a rule, the Americans also made no secret of the particular sympathetic feeling they had for the French girls and so as a natural sequence, marriage resulted.

Many such pairs now are puzzled whether the wife should accompany her husband to America or the husband should make his home in France. It is expected that fully fifty percent of the benefits will adopt France for their future home.

GERMANS SEEK EMPLOYMENT

COBLENZ, March 19.—(By Mail)—Statements published recently in the newspapers in unoccupied Germany that German laborers were being sought for employment in the United States caused such a rush of civilians to Third army headquarters in Coblenz that American officers caused to be published denials of the truth of these stories. Many men and quite a few women and girls, having heard of the newspaper articles from the other side of the neutral zone, came to Coblenz from towns and districts as far as fifty miles away.
