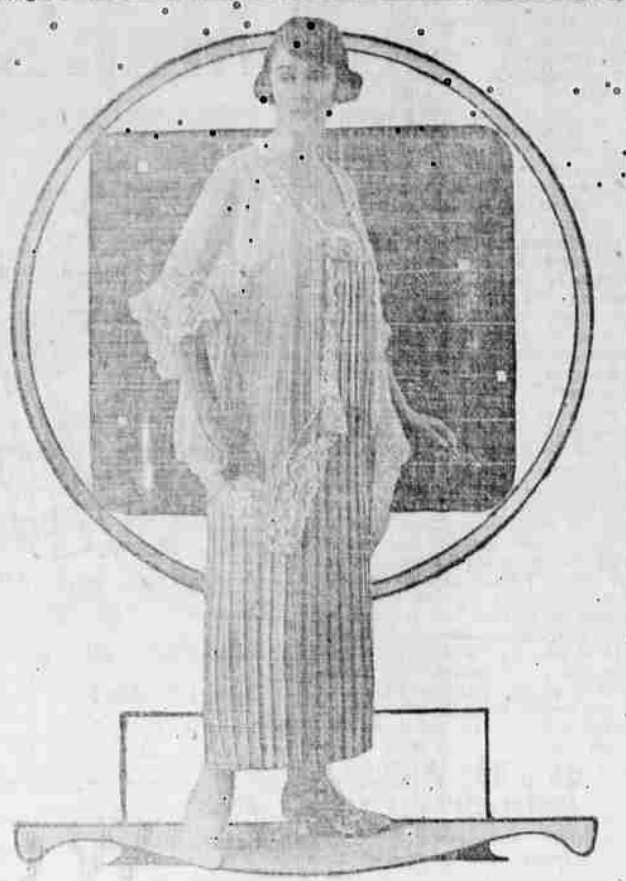

Over this there is a coat of crepe de chine in the same color. It has short sleeves with a neatly finished border from their edges and lace at the bottom. A quilling of the crepe de chine makes the best of the lace for the neck and front of the coat. The lace is a fine cream-colored variety that has a way of falling in graceful lines.

GOVERNMENT SELLS LAND

Surplus Stock Being Put on Market in Small Lots of Current Prices

WASHINGTON, April 14.—The War department yesterday announced that disposition of surplus stocks of land owned by the War department is being made at special local market prices in the community in which a surplus is held. This surplus is scattered throughout the country and in no one place is there a large quantity. Reports show only 7000 tons of land to be in the possession of the War department. This surplus is not sufficient to affect the market in any way.

NEBRASKANS OPPOSE TO DAYLIGHT SAVING PLAN

Lincoln, Neb., April 14.—Four Nebraska towns—Red Cloud, Dayton, Gedling and Beatrice—have refused to abide by the daylight saving regulation and will turn back the clocks an hour. Two of the towns returned to the old time Sunday. Municipal authorities assert their action is in defiance to wishes of the farming community.

MURDER WAR SECRETARY.

COPENHAGEN, April 14.—Her Nearing, war minister in the government of Saxony, was killed at Dresden yesterday by disgruntled soldiers to whom the minister had refused a hearing. The war ministry was stormed by demonstrators who dragged out Nearing and threw him into the Elbe, where he was shot and killed as he tried to swim to the bank.

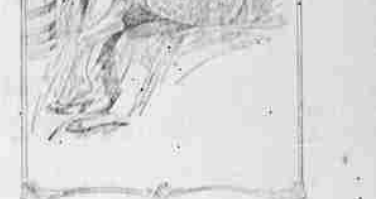
