organization of local women is doing; and Mrs. W. J. Bohnenkamp then followed with a talk on the work of the P. A. association. Mrs. Bohnenkamp mentioned as one thing greatly needed a suitable camping ground here to accommodate tourists; then she urged the providing of a swimming pool. There is a bath house, she said, and a swimming "hole," but there is no water there by a dam-site. Her talk was brief, but it was effective. Jacob Traynor, secretary of the Community Chorus, took a few minutes to tell about that organization, their accomplishments and their aspirations, and Miss Lucia Haley responded to the chairman's request to give the public library an equal share of the recognition and the praises that were being handed around.

On a different line, then, came Capt. W. G. Smith, of the Salvation Army, and Mrs. F. G. Schilke, chairman of the Child Welfare Committee of the State Council of Defense. These were two of the most vitally interesting matters discussed, presenting as they did the problem of looking after the orphans. Conditions in La Grande in this respect are frightful, said Capt. Smith, giving a sincere talk on what the Salvation Army tries to do and on the need there is of help for unfortunate girls. The Army, he said, with the proper encouragement, would take up the matter of building a home where such girls could be housed and helped, and he hopes to see his desire realized before very long. Mrs. Schilke was glad that Capt. Smith brought this question up, and she had a few statements along the same line to add to what he had said. She had other suggestions for the city and for the Ad. Club members to think and ponder over—and take action on—such as enforcement of the curfew law, which is neglected in this city. The need of a detention home for girls had often been impressed upon the city officials, she said, but never successfully. She hoped to see that event come soon through education of public sentiment.

Dr. W. D. McMillan, who has charge of Chautauqua arrangements, gave a report on what the program for La Grande will be this summer. The probable date of the commencement, he said, is July 5th; and there is a fine program promised. With the conclusion of these addresses, the gathering adjourned, with the appointment of Ed. Coolidge, president of the Ad. Club, to act as chairman of the next meeting.

truck, near the Red Cross canteen, with the warm Oregon sunshine beating down and a crowd of people and happy to listen. Mr. Maddo expanded his announced "ten minutes talk" into a twenty-five minute oration. His talk was vigorous and unapologetic, and full of effective and unapologetic arguments in favor of the loan. What Americans are asked to do at this time—to lend some of their money, on the safest security in the world and at a good rate of in-

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terest, is nothing. Mr. Maddo said, to the price paid for victory by the men who went into the forefront of the battle "over there." The real price of victory—what they bought it with—he said, was human arms, legs, eyes, lives, and blood. "None of us were told," he said, "that we would have to give an arm or a leg, or an eye for this victory, we would give all our money, anything we possess, except wife and children, to escape; and we would not ask the government for a bond in return, either." He refuted the argument that the patriotism of Americans has evaporated. "We are the greatest nation in the world; we have greatest institutions in existence; boundless resources and unlimited prospects for the future," he declared, "and this Victory Loan is going to prove that there are just as many 100 per cent Americans in this nation as there ever were."

Going on to speak of the efforts being made to bring about peace, he upheld the President and other men who are striving to reach high ideals and bring the world up to them. America kept out of Europe's troubles for years, he said, until she became so great and her interests so wide that when the last great struggle came it was inevitable that she should be drawn in. The world has always been organized for war, he said, and that is why sixty thousand of America's best sleep in foreign fields and hundreds of thousands of others will bear the marks of the conflict and the evidences of suffering the rest of their lives. The world has never, until now, had a chance to organize for peace; and if we stand for what we should, he said, Americanism, humanitarianism and civilization, the world will be organized for peace now.

Mr. Maddo was frequently interrupted in his speech by applause and received a hearty greeting when he finished. Before returning to his private car he shook hands with many in the crowd, next him and as the crew of the yard engine, who were cutting out a sleeper, brought his car back to the train again and then, disappointed, he walked up and greeted them with a cordial handshake.
