WANTS MORE REVENUES

E. O. L. & P. COMPANY WOULD ABOLISH DISCOUNTS

Company Also Seeks to Increase Rates on Power and Heat on its System.

Setting forth its desire to abolish the ten per cent discount for prompt payment of light bills and also to increase the rate charge for electrical power and heat throughout its district, the Eastern Oregon Light and Power Company has gone before the Public Service Commission with a lengthy petition praying that body to grant its requests.

The company claims it has performed the commission's order issued in 1915 to the letter; that its rates for electricity have been constructed along lines to encourage industry, etc., and that the abnormal conditions now existing cause it to appeal for higher rates and more revenue. It is claimed in its petition that dividends have not been paid, betterments have been curtailed. A fifteen per cent increase in wages is alleged to have been made by the company.

Probably the strangest thing about the petition is the claim that the "daylight saving law" has reduced the revenue from lighting from six to eight per cent. It was generally believed by the public that the daylight law was in favor of the lighting companies but now comes one concern at least which denies the statement and states positively it affects its revenue.

The date of the hearing has not been set, but it is a question that vitally interests everyone in La Grande, Union and Elgin and it is quite probable the Union County Ad Club will appoint an attorney to appear for the consumers at the hearing.

Salem After Telephone Rates

Indications are that corporations of a public service nature will have to fight for any increase, if the attitude of Salem people can be taken as indicative of the condition of the public mind in Oregon. The telephone company of that city raised its rates and gave notice of intention to make further increases whereupon the commercial club immediately launched a campaign to sell a \$200,000 bond issue and install a municipal telephone plant. It is also claimed that the Bell telephone company, which has been Garritized, is not getting by with its heavy advance in rates for long distance, due to the fact that long distance business has greatly reduced since the rates were adopted. On long distance the advance is tremendous. Formerly a minimum call to Baker from La Grande was 25 cents and now it is 49 cents. The same is true of telegraph companies, for the night letter rate from Portland to La Grande was formerly 50 cents and now it is 79 cents.

What Will the Public Do?

As for a means of communication the public is in bad shape. La Grande people can not depend on a letter reaching Portland any regular time. Night letters are uncertain as they are mailed when received, and regular telephone and telegraph service has been advanced out of reason. One merchant remarked, after considering all phases of doing business at the present time: "Me for the farm, where I can live within myself and will need none of Mr. Garrison's wires."

EASTERN OREGON LIVE STOCK OWNERS PLAN A BIG TIME
