CITY MANAGER MAKES REPORT

The several departments report for the week ending April 12 are:
One fire at 1919 Third street caused from burning flue. There was very little damage and no material used by the fire department. Fifteen volunteers responded to the call.

The activities in the police department as reported by the chief were three arrests, \$60 in fines collected, \$1.49 for animal impounded, several dogs disposed of, answers to numerous calls for food and other animals running at large, putting up quarantine flags and attending to many minor matters.

The force were engaged one afternoon in taking care of the crowd at the Trophy train. They also gave some assistance to the state in apprehending violators of prohibition laws. From the recorder's office there were issued licenses for one rooming house, one popcorn wagon and two buildings permits. The recorder is also preparing statements of all delinquent assessments. Warrants issued for March bills \$3,683.03.

The water force were employed in making repairs, installing meter and making one tap at 1501 Cove avenue. Several trips were made to the city reservoir investigating the leakage at that place. These leaks are of old standing but as they appear to be getting worse an effort will be made to have same repaired as soon as a thorough examination can be made.

The streets force were employed in hauling rubbish, dragging and repaving streets. The grades have also been used on some streets. About 225 loads of rubbish have been hauled to the dump and the various old dumping grounds within the city have been cleaned up. Hereafter the city dumping ground will be on the city property north of the old pumping station in Riverside addition. We have endeavored to have all alleys and streets cleared of rubbish and other refuse and have called attention of property owners to the fact that there is an ordinance against throwing anything of this nature in to the streets or alleys. The manager and street superintendent took advantage of the business men's luncheon on Tuesday of this week to call attention to our efforts to have a cleaner town and are assured of the co-operation of the ladies' Neighbors Club and other ladies in the work.

I have had contract prepared for an engineer to be employed in the water system and forwarded same to Ontario for signature of Mr. Kelsey as per instructions of the commission. I am also having resolutions prepared declaring intention of city to create improvement district on Walnut street and Adams avenue as per petition of property owners.

Complaint having been made that beef and other hides were being stored by certain dealers within the city limits, an investigation was made by the police department. A few hides were found and ordered removed and the practitioner ordered discontinued. The caretaker at Beaver Creek reports water in the reservoir within about six feet of the spillway, and still considerable snow. I have had the caretaker go over the pipe line as far as Whiskey Saddle. He reports two or three minor leaks which will be repaired at once. He will also repair the Beaver creek road and put in shape as soon as practicable. A leak was discovered in the 18 inch line near the city reservoir which is being repaired today.

C. O. Murchison has been employed as fire chief and C. M. Combs as first assistant. There is still one position to be filled. The city recorder has tendered his resignation to take effect as soon as a successor can be appointed. Respectfully submitted, JOHN COLLIER, Manager.

Northern Country Would Forbid All Agitation Against the Government

JUNEAU, Alaska, March 12.—(By mail)—Use of any flag or emblem symbolizing a purpose to overthrow by violence either the government of Alaska or the United States, or cause damage to property or cessation of industry, is forbidden in a bill introduced in the territorial house. The bill also makes it unlawful for any one to advocate, incite or write with intent to forward the above purposes. Penalty of \$5000 maximum fine, or both, is provided. An emergency clause is attached to the measure.

DESLER IS HOME FROM SERVICE

JOSEPH BOY HAD MANY FIGHTING EXPERIENCES

Saw Submarine Sunk by Gaps From Ship Upon Which He was Riding

JOSEPH, April 17.—John G. Desler, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Desler of Joseph, and one of the best known young men in the county, returned Monday of this week after spending over a year in Uncle Sam's service. After his entrance into the army on March 27, 1917, he was taken to Ft. Douglas, Utah, and then to Ft. Myer, Va. In the early summer he crossed the "pond" on the Maritima. While on the water a submarine was sighted and sunk by the gun crew. Landing in Liverpool on July 7th, he was put in a rest camp. ("restless" the boys called it) where they remained for a few days. He was taken across the channel and by early August was under fire. At La Perle an air raid was experienced and five of his intimate friends were killed and nineteen wounded. Had he not have had trouble with the truck he was driving he too would have been with the fellows who were killed, but as it was he did not reach the camp until it was over. As a member of the 37th Engineers Mr. Desler was in nearly all of the big drives including the Alsace-Marne offensive, St. Mihiel offensive, Argonne offensive and many others. After the signing of the armistice his company was one of the first to enter the enemy territory. One of the exploits of his company was to steal an entire train from the Germans and use it for their own needs. Mr. Desler reports that the American boys were treated fine by the enemy, simply because they were afraid to treat them otherwise.

His many friends are glad to welcome John home again and are all thankful that he was able to come through the ordeal without a scratch. It seems mighty fine to think that so many of the local boys are returning unharmed to us. So again take up their places in the community.
